NUTRITIOUS CORN BREAD.



One New York hotel has arranged a thoroughly patriotic corn bread recipe. It combines cornmeal with rye flour, both of which are being consumed in greater quantities this year in order to release wheat flour for the allied nations. This recipe fills a large pan—16 by 22 inches—and contains the following ingredients: One quart milk, four ounces butter substitute, ten ounces light syrup or honey, three eggs, pinch salt, two pounds cornmeal, one pound rye flour and two ounces baking powder.

The butter and syrup are thoroughly mixed. Then add the eggs gradually, pour in the milk, then add the rye flour mixed with the cornmeal and baking powder. Bake in a hot oven.

BAKER SAYS WE WILL WIN

Tuscania Disaster Characterized as
Fresh Challenge to World.

Washington.—Secretary Baker issued the following statement:

"The sinking of the Tuscania brings us face to face with the losses of war in its most relentless form.

"It is a fresh challenge to the civilized world by an adversary who has refined, but made more deadly, the stealth of the savage in warfare. We must win this war and we will win this war.

"Losses like this unite the country in sympathy with the families of those who have suffered loss; they also unite us to make more determined our purpose to press on."

AMERICAN NOW IN CHARGE

Command of U. S. Sector Turned Over
By French Authorities.

With the American Army in France.—An American general now commands the sector of the front recently taken over by our troops. When the Americans first entered the sector it was under the command of a French general commanding a certain large unit of the French army. Now we have control.

In turning the sector over to the American general the French commander issued a general order in which he expressed complete satisfaction with our troops and was confident that the sector was in good hands and, if attacked would defend it with great valor.

Mrs. Lena Bergmann, wife of Captain Bergmann, for years in charge of the lifesaving station at the mouth of the Umpqua river, near Gardiner, died suddenly from heart trouble at Eugene.

For the first time in more than two years the Southern Pacific company last week overcame its car shortage in Oregon and reported to the Oregon public service commission a surplus of 91 cars.

A drive for \$1500 is being made among the Linn county farmers to secure a county agricultural agent. Should the \$1500 be raised it will make a \$4500 fund available for hiring an agriculturist.

Passenger and freight traffic on the line of the Valley & Siletz railway, running westward from Independence to Valsec, has increased to such an extent that \$20,000 has been expended in new equipment.

Special investigation of capacity of all shipyards in the Portland district will be made at once upon orders from Vice Chairman Piez.

The ship-knee industry is rapidly assuming big proportions in Clackamas county. The Molalla country also has become a big ship-knee center.

The Sun Dial ranch, north of Troutdale, is shipping turnips by the carload to the Wittenberg-King company at The Dalles, to be evaporated.

Efforts to locate Miss Mignon Swanson, a young woman who was teaching school near Halsey, and who disappeared mysteriously a few days ago, have been unsuccessful.

Cattle thieves have been operating in Lane county on a wholesale scale, according to Sheriff Parker, who will offer a reward of \$500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the rustlers.

Attorney-General Brown has prepared ballot title for an initiative petition filed by E. L. Walters, of Oregon City, which proposes to prohibit all trap, seine or fish wheel fishing in all the rivers of the state.

Russians Battle With Roumanians.
Petrograd.—Serious fighting has taken place between Russians and Roumanians in the neighborhood of Galatz, near the border, according to a report received from Austrian headquarters at Brest-Litovsk.

The public service commission is notifying all public utilities that their annual reports for the year ending December 31, 1917, must be submitted to the commission by April 1.

Judge J. C. Moreland, one of the oldest members of the Oregon bar and for the past 10 years clerk of the Oregon supreme court, died suddenly at Salem from heart trouble.

After serving for 15 years as state labor commissioner for Oregon, O. P. Hoff has made formal announcement of his candidacy for the republican nomination for state treasurer.

In his annual report for the year 1917, Deputy Sealer of Weights and Measures Spence Wortman, shows a total of 9657 scales examined, of which 224 were condemned permanently.

SUPPLY HEAD FOR
ARMY IS NAMED

Washington.—Edward J. Stettinius, of New York, was appointed surveyor-general for all army supplies.

From the outbreak of the war Mr. Stettinius has been in sole charge of the allied purchases in this country and has been responsible for the development of the production of war materials.

The appointment of Mr. Stettinius to the new post, which is in effect that of a munitions supervisor and director for all war department purchases, was viewed as the answer of the administration to the munitions ministry bill pending in the senate. It effects a complete consolidation of all war department supply questions under the surveyor-general, and on the face of the statement issued by Mr. Baker, Mr. Stettinius is to be backed by complete authority in his responsible position.

Democrats Favor Suffrage

Washington.—Indorsement of the federal amendment for woman suffrage was voted by the executive committee of the national democratic committee here after a referendum to the committeemen representing the 48 states.

Germans Send Ultimatum to Rumans.

Basel, Switzerland.—German newspapers arriving here say that Field Marshal von Mackensen sent an ultimatum to the Roumanian government, February 6, demanding that peace negotiations be begun within four days.

Senators Would Return Railways.

Washington.—The senate commerce committee, by a vote of 7 to 6, decided to amend the administration railway bill to provide that the government shall relinquish control over the railroads within one year after the end of the war.

Dry Act Enacted by North Dakota.

Bismarck, N. D.—The senate with only two dissenting votes has concurred in the house resolution ratifying the federal prohibition amendment negotiated by but 12 members of the two houses.
