liens, leaving the farmer nothing. On the other hand, there is a prospect that, with the plant in operation, these claims now due may be paid sometime in the future.

Mr. Peery will give his best endeavor to conduct the plant in a manner which will enable it to pay expenses and a profit besides. He did so during the most of his past management and believes he can do so again. Knowing Mr. Peery for many years, his character for integrity and business ability, the farmers will probably agree to his assuming the management. Mr. Peery has no financial interest whatever in the condensery. His only interest is in Scio and the community and, for this reason, is willing to give his experience and business ability to working out the matter to the satisfaction of all concerned.

In the mean time the Seattle owners will put in any additional money they can to put the plant on its feet as quickly as possible.

A meeting of the creditors will be called in a few days to place the proposition before them. Should everything work out favorably the plant will be placed in operation about March 1.
