Soldier Green in Europe

Windy Knowe Hospital,
January 2, 1918.

Dead Dad and Mother:

As I am able to get out of bed and walk around, they let me write.

Our transport reached Liver pool December 18. I was sick and taken to the hospital. For two weeks I didn't know very much about the outside world. One thing I do know. I was awfully lonesome and wished that I was home. When I began to get better the nurse told me that I had had pneumonia.

The nurses are very kind and faithful and have to work hard; they get no wages and must pay board when they eat here. There are six men in this ward. One of them has been wounded four times, but he is able to be about the last few days and is anxious to get back to the front and catch a few more of those uncivilized Huns.

We are 200 miles from the firing line. My regiment is somewhere near there and I will be glad when I can join them and partly pay, at least, for the many kind things that have been done for me. Nurse says that I will be ready for the spring drive.

For breakfast I have graham bread and eggs and a bowl of mush. For supper, fish, potatoes, boiled cabbage and other vegetables. Sugar is scarce. Potatoes are the only food of which there is a plenty.

There is a drill camp not far from here. I can hear the practice cannons boom and the buzzing airplanes overhead.

Transports reach here nearly every day from the U. S. Thousands are coming and going all the time. One soldier told me of the hand bombs he used. You pull out a peg or a ring and throw it; it explodes just five seconds after peg is pulled.

The weather is fine; the sun shines nearly every day. Once in a while we have foggy, dark days; the fog is very dense, you can almost reach out and grab it.

At the end of this month I will have half of my liberty bond paid. I bought \$200 worth. My pay goes on wherever I am. With my foreign service pay I get \$36.60 per month. My insurance and what I pay on liberty bonds cost me \$26.50 per month.

I should like to be at home and take a ramble in the Ford. I will write often now that I am able, but am not permitted to say anything about the war. Our letters need no stamps. I am feeling fine. Give my best regards to everybody.
