AMERICANS UNDER FIRE

News from the western front confirms the estimate Americans had made of the valor of their own soldiers and adds to the pride that every patriot must feel. It now develops that the first formidable encounter was no routine "raid," made by the Germans merely to feel out our strength and temper, but a carefully rehearsed enterprise. Evidently the enemy intended to deliver a smashing blow, hoping in some way to affect the American morale. But they got as good as they gave and if anyone's morale suffered it was that of the "shock troops" who had hoped to have everything their own way.

Every bit of news of the actual fighting on the front is stimulating to the pride, and it ought to stiffen the moral backbone of the folks at home. And the more news we are permitted to receive the better it will be for all concerned. We are a people to whom the intimacies, the little details, mean much. Some of our allies did not understand this at first. When American troops were first assigned to duty in the trenches, and captured their first prisoner and the news was cabled to the United States, the British and French, who have been taking prisoners for more than three years, were inclined to indulge in sarcasm at the Americans' expense. It no doubt was irritating to be asked "how is your prisoner today?" by these veterans of the long campaign. But the fact was that the first prisoner was "news," not because the taking of him would be a mighty factor in ending the war, but because it symbolized and symbolized the actual participation of our men in the mighty conflict. The first soldiers killed, the first prisoners taken, the first skirmish, the first raid, the first great battle — progressively they show us that our men are grimly doing their duty "over there."

It is the American way to want to know the human details. By visualizing the situation of the soldier clearly as may be we prepare ourselves mentally and spiritually to be his comrades in the best sense of the term. We are not yet blasé, or so hardened to horror that we want to hear nothing more about it. We want the particulars. They are, as has been said, inspiring. Our allies already have ceased making jokes about "our prisoner," for our prisoner is no longer in the singular. Our men have been publicly praised by veteran officers of France and Great Britain. Everyone now knows that in major enterprises as well as minor ones they may be relied upon. It is being shown that, man for man, American soldiers are more than a match for the enemy. "Man for man" is a significant phrase. If it can be demonstrated that man for man and woman for woman and child for child, the people at home also are "more than a match for the enemy," we shall have final assurance that our war is going to be won. An example of individual achievement is being set by the men in uniform; it should be followed by every citizen who calls himself a patriot. The most that we can do at home will be small by comparison with the every-day duties which our soldiers are performing as a matter of course. — Oregonian.

Britain Must Have More Wheat.

Washington.—An urgent appeal was made to the United States by Great Britain for more wheat. Without it, Lord Rhonda cabled to the food administration, the allies may not have food enough to win the war.

Notwithstanding the fact that Astoria has recently completed the erection of a new 20-room grade school building, the number of pupils is increasing so rapidly that the district must build three more structures before the opening of the coming school year.

The boarding school at the Umatilla Indian agency, which has been a fixture there almost as long as the agency has been established, is to be discontinued June 30, according to word received by Superintendent Swartzlander from Cato Sells, commissioner of Indian affairs.

The state highway commission has under contemplation now road work the construction of which will be done at an estimated cost of \$7,330,150, according to the report for the fiscal year ending November 30, just completed by State Highway Engineer Nunn, and approved by the commission. Of this amount \$541,973.33 has been expended for construction and \$143,638.91 for engineering, or a total of \$685,612.24.
