

DISCIPLINE.

The vital importance of discipline in the Army was emphasized the other day by a veteran instructor at one of the Eastern officers' training camps in an address to Harvard students. He said in the course of his talk that he had made especial observations as to the value of college men and had found them lacking chiefly in amenability to discipline. Too strong emphasis upon individuality has had its drawbacks. "If you teach the boys nothing else," he said pointedly, "send them to the camps disciplined."

It is now revealed that the first Canadian Army, for all its dash and high initiative and undoubted bravery, was sent back to England after a trial, to acquire discipline. An Australian army on a memorable occasion forgot its discipline, dashed ahead of its objective and was mowed down by its own artillery. It lost 600 men in half an hour—unnecessarily, too. These men possessed unlimited courage, but they would have served their country better by obeying orders to the letter.

Discipline has been defined as the reduction of common sense to a formula. Idealists chafe under it, but they must submit to it for their own good. The disciplined soldier has an immeasurably better chance for his life.—Oregonian.

There is no discount on the patriotism of the American people. We may differ politically on local National affairs and get so excited about the matter that the inherent of the foreign government would think we are ready for civil war. But notice the difference. When war was declared against Germany, party was forgotten. All Americans rallied to the standard, with both men and money to defend the life of democracy in the world. Only a few German sympathizers and Am-

They are not willing to allow the majority to rule. But the majority will and must rule. It is nonsensical and suicidal for the minority to undertake to force matters. That is the Hun method and must not win. Agitate and educate, but do not try force. The majority of the American people love their Government and are ready to fight for it. The Germans are now aware of this fact.
