War Bread

Cook 2 cups corn meal in one quart boiling water containing one teaspoonful salt, and cool. Dissolve yeast and sugar in 1½ pints lukewarm water and add enough white flour to make a batter. Beat thoroughly until smooth. After adding 1 teaspoon salt add corn meal mush and white flour alternately, thoroughly kneading with the hands until dough is smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl and set in warm place for 1½ hours. Mould into loaves, cover and let rise 1 hr., (or until double in bulk). Bake one hour.

LEBANON WOMAN FACES BAD CHARGE

Officers Force Doors—Mother Refused to Permit Son Drafted for the Army.

Edwin Brandell and his mother, Mrs. Albertina Brandell, were started on their way to Eugene Monday by a United States marshal and will have the opportunity of telling their troubles to the United States commissioner there. Brandell is the Lebanon man whose mother refused to allow him to be drafted.

Brandell was called to go with the 45 who left Saturday night. When the time came for him to appear he was decidedly absent, so Sheriff Bodine sent a call to his deputy at Lebanon to arrest him. The Lebanon deputy arrested the man and his mother, but this was not done until a posse broke through two doors to get into the house.

Mrs. Brandell was brought to Albany and spent the night in a hotel while her son spent the night in jail as a deserter. The next morning Mrs. Brandell was arrested under the espionage act and will face the federal authorities. She continues to declare that her son will not serve in the army. She is a native-born German.

Young Brandell is not particularly averse to serving in the army. He seems to regret the incident; while he does not accuse his mother it is evident she is mostly to blame in the affair, declare the officers.

Mrs. Brandell is extreme in her views and declares that the constitution does not give the right to draft, despite the recent ruling of the supreme court. She declares she will appeal to the highest authority and is said to have declared she would rather see her son dead than in the army.—Albany Democrat

Later—Mother and son were put under \$5000 bonds.

U-BOATS OUT FOR 6-MONTHS' CRUISE

Stay in Western Atlantic Waters to Last Until August, According to Orders.

New York, June 4.—A member of the crew of the U151, the German submarine which destroyed the schooner Edna, told Enoch Roker, one of the Edna's crew, that the U-boat fleet plans to remain in American waters until August.

Roker, for eight days a prisoner on the submarine, was rescued after he and other prisoners had been placed in the open boats of another sunken ship and arrived here last night.

"The storekeeper told me," said Roker, "that when they left Kiel two months ago, they were provisioned for a six months' cruise and intended to stay on the western Atlantic coast until August at least."

"He did not tell me how many submarines there were in the fleet, as the officers on board kept vigilant eyes and ears."

Myron Miller Discharged.

Myron Miller, who enlisted in the navy a little more than a year ago, came home last week with an honorable discharge in his pocket. He had been in a hospital in Boston for about two months, with rheumatism as the ailment. He now designs going to the Breitenbush hot springs to try to get well so that he can again enter the service.
