Wednesday forenoon—U. S. history, writing (penmanship), music, drawing.

Wednesday afternoon—Physiology, reading, manual training, composition, domestic science, methods in reading, course of study for drawing, methods in arithmetic.

Thursday forenoon—Arithmetic, history of education, psychology, methods in geography, mechanical drawing, domestic art, course of study for domestic art.

Thursday afternoon—Grammar, geography, stenography, American methods in language, thesis for primary certificate.

Friday forenoon—Theory and practice, orthography (spelling) physical geography, English literature, chemistry, physical culture.

Friday afternoon—School, law, geology, algebra, civil government.

Saturday forenoon—Geometry, botany.

Saturday afternoon—General history, bookkeeping.

Cheese Factory Matters.

We are informed the Richardson Gap Cheese Co. has arranged their business matters in a manner satisfactory to both company and patrons. The company is incorporated with the following officials: John Shimanek, president and general manager; Joe Bartu, vice-president; J. D. Densmore, secretary; John Egr, treasurer; all of whom are directors, and John Davenport. The secretary and treasurer are both under bonds. The company is now paying for milk on a basis of 48 cents for butterfat. This price of course will be varied to correspond with the market price. Six hundred pounds of cheese is being manufactured daily with a growing custom. The company has plenty of money for operating purposes and pays for the milk bought every two weeks.
