Jackson Held for Forgery.

Seattle, July 27.—S. C. Jackson, president of the Logan Commercial company, was arrested today on indictments charging him with forging bills of lading. Government prosecutors allege Jackson borrowed more than \$10,000 on the worthless bills. One set of bills purported to show, it is alleged, that Jackson shipped to New York 1000 cases of condensed milk for the Western Condensed Milk Co. of Newberg, Or. and the Scio Milk Co. of Scio, Ore. In reality no milk was shipped, it is charged. Jackson was an agent of the two Oregon firms.

Mr. Jackson was in Scio frequently while the Logan Commercial Co. had control of the condensery and was at that time a member of the Logan company.
