Condensery is Scio's Asset.

the factory in proper condition it can be kept sweet and pure until processed.

An improvement since we last visited the plant is the boiler room where two large boilers are installed. The building is brick, cement floor and roomy enough for additional machinery when needed.

At present milk is being condensed and shipped to Portland where it is converted into the sweetened product. Manager Peery thinks machinery will soon be installed here to enable them to add the necessary sugar.

Scio and vicinity now has an opportunity to build up a milk products concern here which will be developed to any capacity required. If farmers and dairymen will furnish the milk the condensery people will do the rest. The price, \$3 per hundred, being now paid for whole milk is equivalent to 75 cents per pound for butterfat—20 cents more than is being paid in Portland. Can you beat it?
