Opposition Account of Roads, Not Bridge.

The following letter from an esteemed subscriber, Mr. J. M. Philpott, implies that the opposition of the south end of the county to Judge McKnight and Commissioner Irvine is because of their attitude towards good roads and not the much wished for bridge at Harrisburg.

The court by its action and in conversation, is not now nor has been opposed to good roads but favors their construction as rapidly as can be done without undue oppression on the taxpayers.

The court has refused its sanction to undertake a system of paved roads reaching out from Albany in some seven or eight directions, because to complete such a system would practically bankrupt the county. The court also, with a vast majority of the county, opposes the Portland road bond graft and the result as to the methods in which the bond money is being expended, justifies the opposition.

The present county court, as well as a large majority of the people, favor good roads and bridges wherever needed; but there is a limit to taxing the people no matter how worthy the purpose of taxation may be.

There may be a few individuals that would want and insist that the county court should build a bridge at Harrisburg at all hazards, and there probably are a few selfish taxpayers who live in parts of the county remote from Harrisburg who would not be in favor of building a bridge in any event.

We are led to believe from your editorial that the failure of the court to build the bridge is the primary cause of the opposition to Commissioner Irvine and Judge McKnight in the south end of the county.

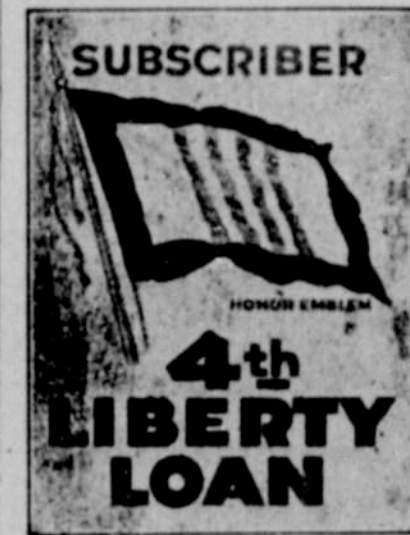
The road problem has been and is the paramount issue. You will remember that at a meeting of the
