C. C. Jackson for the Legislature

C. C. Jackson is not a stranger to the old settlers of the Santiam country for he grew from boyhood to manhood up in the Bilyeu Den country, attended the public schools there and married a Bilyeu Den girl.

He lived in the Scio country until 1892 when he was elected sheriff of Linn county, in which office he served the people efficiently and creditably.

After retiring from the shrievalty he purchased a large farm a few miles west of Halsey where he now resides.

In 1916 Mr. Jackson was elected one of the delegates to the national democratic convention, where it was his pleasing duty to help renominate Woodrow Wilson for president, who is now the leading statesman of the world and who will doubtless dictate the peace terms which will bring to an end the greatest war in history.

When I accepted the republican nomination for state senator from Linn county, after having been "written in" at the primary election, I did not dream that circumstances would be such that I would have to rely almost entirely upon the personal work of my friends, due to my broken leg, which will probably keep me in bed until election time. I was a member in the House of the 1913 session of the legislature and was returned to the House at the 1917 session by the largest vote ever given a member of that body from Linn county.

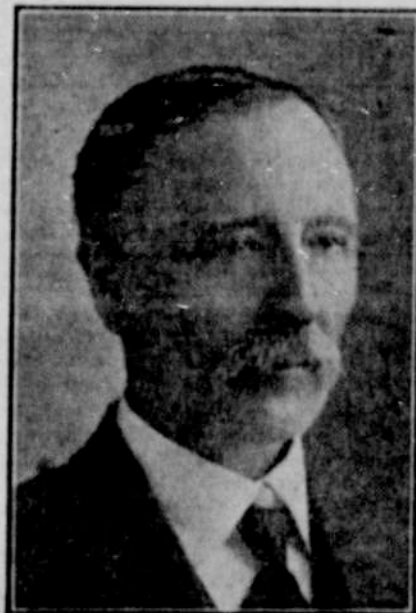
