Why Not a Dairy Association?

Dairying, if it is not now, is destined to soon become the leading industry of this Santiam country. With our numerous streams of pure mountain water, fertile lands and the easy production of food for the cow, dairy products, beef, pork and other farm products, other than grain for market, our shipments of oats and wheat are likely to grow less than more in the future.

If this is a correct viewpoint a dairy association of farmers and dairymen for the purpose of interchanging ideas and experiences is highly essential.

Every farmer or dairyman wishes to make his dairy herd pay. If it does not pay, find out the reason. If a cow does not pay a profit find it out. Weigh and test her milk. Find if she is a boarder or a profit earner. Find out the most economical feed to grow. Know the best method of handling your dairy herd.

By meeting in association once or twice a month and discussing these matters frankly and honestly many of these things can be ascertained. Your interchange of opinions and experiences will be of more value than can be had from the trained expert.

Yet no not neglect the expert. Invite him to come to your association and lecture. If he is practical and talks from his experience as a successful dairyman you can learn from him. But the most is to be gained by interchanging ideas with your neighbor. He is working under the same conditions as yourself and therefore is practical to you.

Moreover, if your neighbor is successful in conducting his dairy it is of profitable advantage to you. A neighborhood of successful dairymen is a good advertisement. It brings men interested in dairying to your community and to your benefit.

All of this can result from a dairy association. And more. It enables you to get a better understanding of your business and to replace loss with a profit.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET.

To the Clerk of School District No. 95, Linn County, Oregon:

Following is a statement of the estimated amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning June, 1918, and ending on June 30, 1919. This Budget is made in compliance with section 217 of the school laws of 1917, and includes the estimated amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax and all other moneys of the district:

Total estimated receipts, not including the money to be received from the tax it is proposed to vote.....\$2750

Total estimated receipts, not including tax to be voted 2750

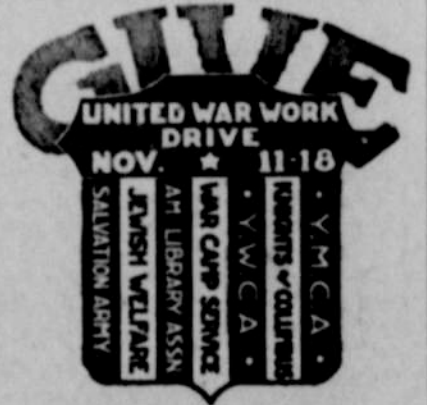
Balance, amount to be raised by district tax.....\$4330

The amount of money to be raised by this special tax is more than the amount raised by special school district tax in the year immediately preceding this, plus six per cent. It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons:

Increase in the amount of tax to be raised is due to the increased cost of salaries and supplies and Failure to vote sufficient taxes in previous years to meet expenses.
