It Doesn't Look Good.

No better plan was ever devised for carrying the war risks of our soldiers and sailors than the government providing insurance in place of pensions. The public was only too glad to assume any necessary burdens in the way of taxation to give the boys protection.

Now comes the "nigger in the woodpile."

Press dispatches announce: "Out of the experience gained may eventually develop expansion of government insurance to old age, industrial and other forms of insurance, in the opinion of officials."

It doesn't take keen vision to see the force at work behind this move. The socialistically inclined politician has already tried to pass so-called health and social insurance measures in legislatures of eastern states—laws patterned after the German system and expanding paternalism. The most recent attempt was in California where the proposition was snowed under three to 1.

Reading between the lines one can see that the same forces are now at work trying to load this system onto the government in a more extended form.

Insure our enlisted men to the limit for life, but watch out that our soldier insurance system is not abused and made the vehicle for loading the general taxpayer down with one of the pet schemes of autocracy.

State Tax

Salem, Nov. 25.—The making up of the state tax levy this year will be more or less a perfunctory task. The levy will be \$3,021,402.30, a safe prediction, as those figures represent 6 per cent increase over the \$2,856,205 of last year, minus \$61,250 paid for Multnomah county bridge bonds last year, with \$58,750 added to be paid for bridge bonds next year. The interests on the bonds decreases each year before the annual payments of \$50,000 to pay off the principal on such bonds.

SUGAR SHORTAGE HITS SPAIN AND PORTUGAL

In Spain and Portugal sugar prices are soaring. Both countries have been seriously affected by the short beet sugar crop in Europe and the lack of ocean tonnage to move stocks of cane sugar isolated in far away ports.

Granulated sugar, home grown, was being sold in Barcelona, Spain, during the early summer at 19 cents a pound. The price of brown sugar in Lisbon, Portugal, fixed by governmental order, was \$1.04 to \$1.12 a pound.

By comparison the price of beet sugar in Sweden is 14 cents a pound.
