Tomato plants by searching investigations have been made to tell some of the secrets of crop growth and yield most valuable to the farmer. The balance between nitrates and carbohydrates best suited to a steady growth of the plant and its production of fruit and seed of good quality, has been disclosed. How this new knowledge was obtained has been explained in a new O. A. C. experiment station bulletin, "Vegetation and Reproduction with Special Reference to the Tomato," by Dr. E. J. Krause and H. R.
