Births 55; boys 32, girls 23.

Died 27; males 15, females 12.

The preponderance of boy babies many will say, was due to the fact that the United States was engaged in war. The fact that more males were called by death than females, may be ascribed to the same cause, as three soldiers were buried during the year.

A Soldier Boy's Letter.

Private Sydney P. Stringer, Battery E, 48th Artillery, somewhere in France, under date November 25, 1918, wrote to a lady friend up Jordan way and The Tribune is permitted to mak extracts as follows:

"Was sure glad to hear from you. Most all the boys here got letters from home today; some as many as 10 or 12, but they had been on the road for some time. You can't imagine how good it makes us boys feel to get letters from home and friends.

As the war seems to be a thing of the past all we think or talk about is getting back to the good old U. S. A. I suppose the people in the States had a grand celebration when they heard the war was over? The French had a grand time; and say, they sure are good to the Yanks.

I was on pass Sunday and went to Vendome, a little town 20 miles from here and had an enjoyable time. I am working in a lumber and wood camp, I like it and am feeling fine and dandy. We live in tents; eight in each tent. I get up in the morning and build a fire and when the bugle blows rouse the rest of the boys and all grab mess kits and make for the mess hall.

There are some nice looking farms in France and it made me feel good to look at them. The towns are all right, too, but are so different from those in the U. S.

Now write as often as you can for it is a great treat to hear from you all.

Road Bond Gun No. 2

Concluded from last week.

This seems to me would eliminate any more bonding schemes, paying useless interest, and give us good roads paid for as we build them.

Now sidetracking a little. Money does not seem to be hard to loan at 6 per cent. The six million bonded debt now upon the state that must run for 20 years, if loaned at six per cent, would amount to \$7,200,000 interest, an additional useless tax for the people to pay. So if Mr. Peery's idea was put in operation and the county assumed the payment of these liberty bonds by issuing county road bonds in lieu thereof bearing five per cent interest, in 20 years' time we will have paid in interest the amount of the bonds, whatever it might be, and nobody be benefited but the parties who hold the bonds. This is being done now in the sale of our six million road bond debt on the state. Not a sale has been made at par and the people are being robbed of thousands of dollars.

I believe that one of the best pieces of legislation that could be done for those liberty bonds now in the hands of the people would be for congress to pass a law making it a finable offense for anyone to buy them for less than their face value; and further, make them good for debts, both public and private, except paying duty on imports.

Why should I be forced through need to sell my bond for which I paid \$100 hard cash, to some bond shark for \$95 and thus rob me of \$5 for which I had to pay eight per cent and borrow the money to buy the \$100 bond.

Such a law would be hard on the bond grabber but it will surely prevent making millionaires and would be absolutely just to the poor men and women and working man who have had to squeeze so hard to buy them.

A bonded city, a bonded county or a bonded state never looked good to me. It means the entailing of debt and taxes on millions yet unborn. The ideas I have given of the things mentioned in this article are along the lines of absolute justice. Whether they could be or would be enacted into law. If they could be is a matter of doubt in my mind, for this word "justice" seems to have lost its meaning in a business world—it is nothing. "Law and order" means to shoot down a thousand working men and women demanding bread; and wild uncured anarchy when a hundred of the nobility or gentry are killed, so runs the idea of justice.
