Destroyers to Light Way.

New York, May 2.—At 11:30 o'clock "some morning in Newfoundland" the navy's trans-Atlantic sea-planes will start on their flight of not less than 18½ hours to the Azores. It was learned at the Rockaway Point naval air station today.

This means that the three planes, the NC-1, 3 and 4 will travel all of one night and will not alight before 5 or 6 o'clock the morning after they depart from Newfoundland.

Sixty destroyers equipped with powerful searchlights will sweep the heavens with continuous swinging beams all night so that during the hours of darkness the air pilots can find their way along a path of light with a "lamp post" approximately every 50 miles.

For daylight reckoning huge numbers will be painted on the decks and the sides of the vessels so that observers in the planes may check their course. Flying will be at a height of about 1000 feet.

Estimates available tonight are that each machine will consume about 650 pounds of gasoline an hour at the start, but that by the time the Azores are reached fuel consumption will have dwindled to something like 360 pounds an hour, the decrease being attributed to lightening of the load carried as gasoline is consumed.

Passed Away.

Paying the Piper.

Now that their war dance is over and the Germans are confronted with the piper's bill, they are wincing sorely over the cost of their wild debauch.

It is, indeed, a monstrous bill and any nation contemplating an extravaganza of a similar kind would better run carefully over its items. There, for example, is the expense of repairing the damages done to Belgium and France, running far up into the billions.

Then comes the loss of hundreds of thousands—millions it may be—of the producers of wealth cut off in the very springtime of life.

To these must be added the loss of those trade relationships with other nations, which were rapidly lifting the Germans to the highest place among the commercial peoples of the world.

Another item on the debit side of their account is the almost total extinction of that confidence which other nations once reposed in their virtue and their honor. Nobody would any longer believe them under oath. They are branded as colossal liars. Their signature to the most sacred treaty will be regarded simply as a matter of form and expected to be valid only in so far as its promises can be enforced by arms. With them all treaties are but "scraps of paper."

More fatal still to those optimistic dreams and grandiose plans which the Germans have cherished is a universal contempt for that language which they meant to make the vehicle for the spread of German kultur into the farthest corners of the globe. By their barbarities they have made its very accents hateful, and the words in which Goethe and Schiller voiced the deepest aspirations of the souls of men can be less patiently listened to by honorable ears than the guttural dissonances of besotted tribes on the banks of the Congo river.

And finally, they have blasted our hopes of any change for the better in their temperaments, their morals or their aspirations.

"They always have been, they are, and they will ever more continue to be—greedy, cruel and revengeful," said General Foch, in warning his people that the only safe and defensible boundary line between Germany and France was the Rhine.

It is a fearful price to pay for a debauch of lust and murder, and its magnitude is only just beginning to be appreciated by the awakened and impoverished but unshamed victims of an illimitable thirst for power and wealth.

That those who dance must pay the piper, is one of those iron laws of Nature, before which thoughtful people tremble, but whose beneficence they solemnly revere.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

RAILROAD COST IN 15 MONTHS \$418,000,000

Marked Reduction of Freight Traffic

Held Responsible For Bad Financial Showing.

Washington, May 6.—Director-General Hines in discussing recent railroad earnings discloses that:

The government's deficit in operating the railroads for the first three months this year, or the difference between net earnings and one-fourth of the guaranteed compensation was about \$192,000,000 for all roads under federal management.

The government's loss for 1918 was \$226,000,000.

The entire government loss in 15 months was \$418,000,000.

Marked reduction of freight traffic was responsible for the bad financial showing and conditions in April show no promise of improvement.

Despite the big government deficits the director-general does not contemplate any general increase in the level of rates, but prefers to wait restoration of normal business conditions.

Yank Deaths Total 75,344.

Washington—Revised casualty totals, announced by the war department, placed the total of dead in the army and marine corps at 75,344, of which 33,887 were killed in action. Prisoners reported were 4791, including 15 now reported to be held by the Bolsheviks.

Of prisoners previously held by the central powers the records show 281 died during internment and 118 of doubtful status.

The grand total of wounded is 201,230, of whom more than 85 per cent returned to duty.

Oregon Bird Life.

At the Peoples Theatre last Thursday evening W. L. Finley, biologist of the state game commission, exhibited moving pictures of bird life in Oregon. Some of these pictures required months to get as the birds were shy. As the pictures were shown, Mr. Finley explained them in an entertaining manner before audiences that twice packed the house. Miss Jeanette Wolter favored the audience with well-rendered bird songs.

In this connection it is well for boys to know that it is unlawful to kill song birds and boys found doing so are apt to get a jolt they'll remember. It is up to parents to see that such practices are stopped else a law officer will call on them. Do away with bean shooters and small rifles before you are pinched.

Corn.

To promote the growing of more and better corn in this locality, the Scio State Bank will give away seed corn of the Minnesota No. 13 variety, as it did last year. Call early if you want some of this as the amount is limited.

Frank Rowen of Jordan brought 32 head of thoroughbred Cotswold sheep into town Wednesday. When they got here they were fagged so much that they laid down within ten minutes after stopping. Some of them were eating grass after they laid down. From appearances they will shear 12 to 15 pounds of wool.

Scio Condensery Increases Output

Scio, May 5.—The condensery is now owned by the Henningsen Produce Co. of Portland and is on a sound financial basis and is receiving about 17,000 lbs of milk each day which will probably be increased to 25,000 per day within the next few weeks. 175 cases containing 48 cans of milk are now being manufactured each day which will be increased to 200 cases per day by the first of the coming month.

Estimating 20 pounds of milk to the can, each day the condensery is using the milk of 850 cows. Seven auto trucks and one wagon are being used to collect the milk and two additional trucks are to be added the first of next week.

The equipment of the plant is being increased to five times its present capacity which means that from 50 to 60 thousand pounds of milk per day can be handled with ease.

At present the company is paying approximately \$1000 per day for milk and labor. There are about 20 men employed. The demand for the milk in the market is greater than the supply.

There are at present about 170 farmers sending milk to the plant and general satisfaction and confidence in the future success of the milk business is being manifested by farmers who advocate increasing their herds and preparing in various ways for a larger business and a greater prosperity.—Albany Democrat.
