PRICE PAID PATRONS FOR MILK Basis on Which Condensery Figures Is Fully Explained

To avoid misunderstanding as to the basis of calculating the price of milk which is paid patrons of the condensery, the following explanation is given:

At the end of the first 15 days and the last 15 days of each month the average price of butter fat at creamery stations for those 15 days is taken as a basis. To this 15 day average price per pound butter fat we add 15 cents. Multiplying the sum obtained by 4 will give the price per hundred pounds of 4% milk. For each tenth of a per cent over 4% add 6c, and for each tenth of a per cent under 4% deduct 6c from the price of a hundred pounds of 4% milk.

Example: Average price of butter fat at cream stations the last 15 days of July is 58c. To this we add 15c, and the sum obtained, which is

73c, is multiplied by 4, which is \$2.92 per hundred for 4 per cent milk at factory. If the test is 4.1 we add 6c to the 4 per cent price. If the test is 4.2 we add 12c to the 4 per cent price, and so on up accordingly as the test is higher.

If the test is 3.9 we deduct 6c from the price of one hundred pounds of 4 per cent milk; if the test is 3.8 we deduct 12 cents, and so on down in a like ratio as the test is lower.

Beginning August 1 we will, thereafter and until further notice, pay 17c per pound over creamery station butter fat price, instead of 15c as now.

We trust that this explanation will enable patrons to know the price we pay for milk, which price is obtained at all times in the manner as shown above.

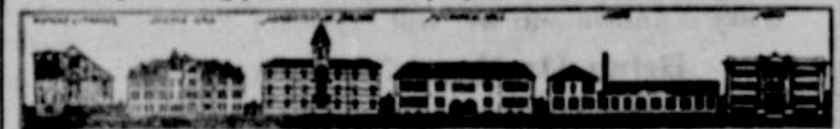
