PIONEER DOCTOR AT ALBANY DIES ALONE

Body of Dr. J. Linsey Hill is Found When Members of the Family Return From Vacation

Albany, Aug. 4.—Dr. J. Linsey Hill, one of Oregon's pioneer physicians, was found dead in his rooms late Sunday night and had evidently been dead since July 24, when he is supposed to have left on an outing at Breitenbush springs. Members of his family had been with him during the evening of July 23 and had left on their vacation on the morning of the 24th. Upon their return Sunday evening it was learned that Dr. Hill had not been at Breitenbush and an investigation disclosed that he had died, probably Thursday morning, while dressing for his trip.

Dr. Hill was born in McNary county, Tenn., February 23, 1845, and came to Oregon with his father in 1853. His wife died many years ago. He is survived by two sons and a daughter, Clyde L. Hill of Sidney, Australia, Gale S. Hill, district attorney of Linn county, and Mrs. Fred Ward, both of the latter residing at Albany. He is also survived by three brothers and a sister, W. Lair Hill of Oakland, Cal., Geo. A. Hill of Seattle, Wash., H. Taylor Hill of Portland, and Mrs. Rufus Thompson of Albany.

J. A. C. Brant, foreman and printer for The Tribune, has estrayed. He left the first of this week, saying he was getting tired of this print shop stuff and was going to do some vacationing.
