FUNDS FOR THE FAIR BUILDINGS

Board Votes \$35,000 to Complete Grounds—Committee to Sell Stock.

At a meeting of the Linn county fair board in Albany, Saturday, it was voted to raise \$35,000 immediately to pay for the site of the fair grounds and also for the construction of various proposed buildings. Of this amount \$9000 has already been pledged.

A committee to sell stock in the fair association was appointed. The buildings will consist of a main pavilion 60x196 feet, machinery sheds and stock buildings; a grandstand to accommodate at least 3000 and an automobile pavilion.

It was voted to have racing and Wayne Stuart was selected as chairman of the committee on racetrack and races.

VETERAN BURIED AT SCIO ON MONDAY

Member of the Famous 91st Laid At Rest After Months of Suffering.

Funeral service of Matheo Polasek, war veteran, who died Saturday at the home of his sister, Mrs. Mary Chytl, were conducted Monday afternoon and interment made at Franklin Butte cemetery. Pall bearers were all ex-service men and members of the local post of the American Legion.

Polasek was 23 years of age and came to this country in 1911 from Bohemia. He was living in Portland when the first indications that his adopted country would become involved in the war came. He immediately signed up with the national guard in March, 1917. A few months later with the declaration of war he was transferred to Camp Lewis and became a member of the famous 91st division. He belonged to company G, 162d infantry.

While the division was in the Argonne, Polasek was badly gassed and sent to a hospital in England. After the armistice he was brought back to America and sent to a hospital in Denver. Failing to recover from his lung infection, he asked for his discharge and was granted a 100 per cent disability because of his condition.

He came to Scio to live with his sister and gradually grew weaker until the end Saturday. He leaves a mother, four sisters and a brother in Bohemia besides his sister here.

SENATE RE-AFFIRMS STAND ON TREATY

Another Deadlock Now Counted All But Certain—Some Democrats Switch

Washington, March 15.—The senate today, by a vote of more than two to one, adopted the new article 10 reservation framed by the republican leaders, thereby reaffirming its disagreement with President Wilson on the dominating issue of the peace treaty controversy.

Its action ended, at least for the present, the efforts for compromise that would insure ratification, and the senate's decision was accepted generally as hastening the treaty toward another deadlock from which it could be released only by a verdict at the polls next November.

The vote, 55 to 26, showed on its face a two-thirds majority for the reservation, but it by no means indicated that two-thirds would vote for ratification on that basis. Included in the majority were irreconcilables, holding about a score of votes which on the ratification roll-call are expected to be cast against the treaty.

Judge Galloway Dead.

William Galloway, for 12 years circuit judge of the third judicial district which includes Linn county, died at the home of his son, Francis V. Galloway, Tuesday.

Judge Galloway was a pioneer of 1851, coming to Oregon with his parents when he was 7 years old. His home has been in Yamhill county and Salem during his life in Oregon.

Judge Galloway was a genial and upright citizen, connected with public affairs of the state for many years and a most likable man in every way.

County Gets Left.

It would appear as if Linn county had been left holding the bag at the conclusion of the triangular financial negotiations that arose out of the conviction of Henry Keeney of Sweet Home for violation of the game law.

The state is a certain winner, Keeney a certain loser, with Linn county hovering betwixt and between. Keeney lost the \$200 fine he paid; the state got \$100 of it and the balance remained with Linn county. The trial cost the county \$131.58 and it is thought the county will have to whistle for the \$31.58. —Democrat.
