but passed a resolution which was a simple concealment of a flat condemnation, and a flat condemnation would have been far more honorable and would have relieved the convention of the charge of cowardice.

President Wilson has said and done a number of things which even his strongest admirers condemn, but the far larger number of good things he has done for his country and humanity will place his name very high on the scroll of fame. Mr. Wilson will not probably make the mistake of asking for a third nomination at San Francisco. But he is likely to endeavor to have his administration endorsed and to have a candidate nominated who, if elected, would carry forward and to completion several incomplete measures which in his judgment would add to the prosperity and welfare of the American people and to the benefit of humanity in general.

No wonder, when he knows and feels that his motives have been good and pure, that he feels deeply chagrined at the coterie of senators who have endeavored to block his every movement. No wonder he feels anger at the Lodge outfit to take advantage of his almost-to-death illness for traducing and misrepresenting his every purpose when he was physically unable to defend his views.

President Wilson is entitled to a fair interpretation of his motive for going to Paris in the interests of humanity. If he made any mistakes while hobnobbing with the diplomats of the old world he is entitled to have his personal purposes and ideas given a reasonably fair interpretation, and his friends at San Francisco will, if they do their duty, do so. At least they should, so far as possible, counteract the conclusions of his political enemies at Chicago.

The secretary of state Friday received two checks aggregating \$10,193.82, covering the sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for the month of May by the Associated Oil company of California and the Shell Oil company of California.

A new prune evaporator will be erected in Dallas this summer by California parties on the E. C. Kirkpatrick tract, North Dallas. The evaporator is the patent of the parties who will install it and if it proves the success they claim for it will greatly revolutionize the drying of prunes in this part of the country.

F. A. Elliott, state forester, has signed the formal contract whereby the government, through Colonel W. H. Arnold, commander of the western department of air service, will assign to Oregon a squad of airplanes for forest fire patrol work during the 1920 season. Under the provisions of the contract a patrol base will be located at Eugene, from which point two planes will make trips daily. One plane will go as far north as Portland, while the other plane will fly south to Medford. At Medford will be located a sub-base, where the planes operating south out of Eugene will stop for gasoline. There will also be operated out of Medford a plane which will travel in a northeasterly direction as far as Summer lake, thence south to Alturas and return to the sub-base.
