**Wilson Supporters Control.**

The convention proceedings of the first day indicate the administration forces control the democratic national convention at San Francisco. The convention will endorse the Wilson administration and the Versailles treaty of peace and league of nations.

The platform will probably be adopted and given out today.

It is opined that not more than six or eight ballots will be required to name the candidate.
