Great Profits in Small Fruits.

Reports from growers of strawberries and small fruits in the region west of the Cascade mountains and between Sacramento and British Columbia show they are making as high as \$1000 an acre.

One grower at Oregon City has shipped over 400,000 strawberry plants to California at \$5 per 1000, a by product of his acreage planted to this crop, showing good money in growing plants.

There has been a scarcity of plants for all kinds of berries, and it will pay growers to get plants in the east and put them out in highly cultivated beds where they can use water to grow plants.

Portland's 26 banks and trust companies aggregated \$152,259,515 at the close of business June 20, this year, reports the state superintendent of banks. This is an increase of over 20 million dollars in a year.

The Astoria's realty board will form a holding company to purchase the property to be used as naval base site and deed the property to the government, according to a plan which has been adopted by the board.

Rev. Father Arthur Lane, rector of the Albany parish of the Roman Catholic church, has received notice that he has been appointed by Pope Benedict XV, a prothotary apostolic of the church with the title of Monsignor.

The body of Mrs. Eddyth Knox, young Wichita, Kan., woman, who disappeared near Albany, was found in a ditch near town. Suicide, prompted by dependency over the death of her husband two years ago, is believed to have caused her death.

The contest of the will of the late Henry L. Pittock, founder of the Portland Oregonian, who accumulated a fortune that reaches nearly 28,000,000, will be carried to the Oregon state supreme court by Mrs. Caroline P. Leadbetter, daughter of Pittock.

B. W. Kern of Portland is in the Benton county jail awaiting a grand jury investigation on the charge of grand larceny. Kern is charged with having stolen \$1055.62 from the American Railway Express company, for whom he was a railway messenger.

Prominent residents of southern Oregon have petitioned Governor Ocott to extend executive clemency to W. E. Butler, under a penitentiary sentence for the killing of McDonald Stewart in Jackson county. It is claimed that he acted in self defense.

Reorganization of the child welfare commission of Oregon presages a prompt and thorough investigation of Portland baby homes with a view to ascertaining the reasons three such homes had refused to accept recent charges from the Oregon Humane society.

Mrs. Edward F. Mathus, operator of a children's nursery in Portland, was found guilty of a brutal and vicious assault on three-year-old Edna Romansky by a municipal court. Judge Roseman sentenced the woman to six months' imprisonment in the city jail.

Marshfield was named as their convention city for next year by the members of the Oregon State Elks' association in session at Salem. No other city was a candidate for the honor. Dr. J. H. Roseberg, of Prineville, was elected president of the association.
