FAIR TRIAL HELD FOR MURDERERS

Change of Venue Denied—Will Be
Tried in Umatilla if Jury
Is Available.

Pendleton, Sept. 14.—Motion for a change of venue made by attorneys for Elvie D. Kerby, John Laffebean, Floyd L. Henderson and Irvin Leroy Stoop, four of the five men indicted for the murder of Sheriff Til Taylor, was denied today by Circuit Judge Phelps, who set the trial of Henderson and Stoop for September 27.

Decision of the judge came after hearing arguments for and against the change, and after consideration of the evidence presented. If great difficulty is experienced in finding a jury for the trial of Henderson and Stoop, attorneys for Kerby and Laffebean may be granted a change of venue for their trial. Otherwise the motion of the latter "will be held under advisement until the necessity for decision arises," says his written statement. Such trial will follow immediately the trial of Stoop and Henderson.

Ninety-six affidavits from Umatilla county men of all callings, collected by District Attorney Keator, as the state's showing against a change of venue, had a direct bearing on the judge's decision.

Many of the men in their sworn statements strongly express the opinion that the men could have a fair trial in Umatilla county. In their affidavits they say that knowing the sentiment as they do, if they were in the defendants' places they would be perfectly willing to be tried by a jury composed of Umatilla county citizens.

"League or No League" Is the Question.

"It is unthinkable that the republican party, which has always prided itself on its high patriotism, should advocate the crowning disgrace of a separate peace with Germany."

This is from the Sacramento, Cal., Union, a republican newspaper, which also says:

"We would be failing in our clear duty to our readers did we not endeavor to prove to them that the assumption industriously exploited by the republican candidate for the presidency and his intimate staff to the effect that the present Polish trouble is proof of the utter failure of the league of nations, is a bald misrepresentation."

"As a matter of fact the plight of Europe today is so plainly due to our failure to enter the league that we wonder at the temerity of any politician in maintaining to the contrary."

Senator Harding is firmly opposed to the league and Governor Cox is enthusiastically for the league. There is no middle ground. It is either the election of Harding and the scrapping of the league, or the election of Cox and the adoption of the covenant that is designed to bring permanent peace to the world.

Saddles and Saddles.

MODELED ON HUMAN FRAME

Efficiency Experts Have Taken That
as Copy for the Rules They
Advocate.

The human frame is 100 per cent efficient, according to the latest dictum of efficiency experts promulgated before the American Society of Industrial Engineers in Philadelphia, says the New York Evening Sun. Some of the faulty have been suspecting that for years, but the promoters of new methods of top speed plant production are so sure of it now that they are modeling organization plans with physicians as their advisers.

Most of the layouts prepared for the industrial organizations look formidable to the average man. What with their pendant brackets and connecting curves the structure of a thousand man plants gives pause even to the modern executive.

It is shown that the schemes which have worked the best are after all as old as the human race, for they are simply arrangements such as may be seen in every man's makeup.

The brain, for instance, as explained by C. E. Knoepfel, who has the chair of factory management at New York university, in his address to his fellow industrial experts, is the same as the executive head or the director of a plant or corporation. The five senses which keep mankind in his bearings correspond to the control of the factory, that is to superintendents and foremen.

The medulla oblongata corresponds to labor, and the small brain or cerebellum which looks after the automatic functions of the body and keeps the arms and legs and trunk active, is translated in terms of production. The relations of the chart for the manufactory and those of the perfectly interacting machinery of the heart and brain and muscles are regarded as virtually the same.

FORGOT HER AWFUL 'MAKEUP'

VOLLEY AT RAIDERS IS UPHELD BY COURT

Judge Wolverton Declares There
Must Be Cause Shown Be-
fore Warrant Issued

Portland, Ore.—A man's home is his castle and he may defend it under certain conditions against prohibition, revenue, or other legal agents, Federal Judge Wolverton held when he sustained a demurrer in the case of John Pitotto and J. Battaglia, charged with using weapons to keep federal agents from entering the former's home.

The court held that even though such legal agents are armed with a search warrant to enter a private home or other building, obtained through their belief that such place is used to harbor a law violator, that is not enough. He decided that the magistrate who issues such a warrant must be satisfied that a violation is being committed and the magistrate is expected to base his belief on other testimony than that of the federal agents.

The decision is regarded as far-reaching. No longer will a "John Doe" or a "Richard Roe" warrant suffice for police to enter private homes and search for liquor or stills.

Revenue officers endeavored to enter the Pitotto home. They met with a volley of shots from the owner, while Battaglia, standing across the street, also opened fire on them.

Pitotto and Battaglia were indicted, charged with using deadly weapons in resisting an officer.

Counsel for defendants contended that officers had violated the fourth amendment of the constitution, that provides that no warrant shall be issued except upon probable cause, supported by oath or information, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized.

"Probable cause is a legal conclusion for the magistrate to deduce, and the mere assertion, under oath, that the affiant believes the law is being violated is insufficient," ruled Judge Wolverton.

The court held, as a consequence, the defendant was entitled to defend his "castle" in any manner he saw fit.

Died

Mrs. Harvey Curry, who was injured near the huckleberry patch by her horse falling on her, died at the hospital in Albany on Wednesday of last week. The funeral occurred on the following day.
