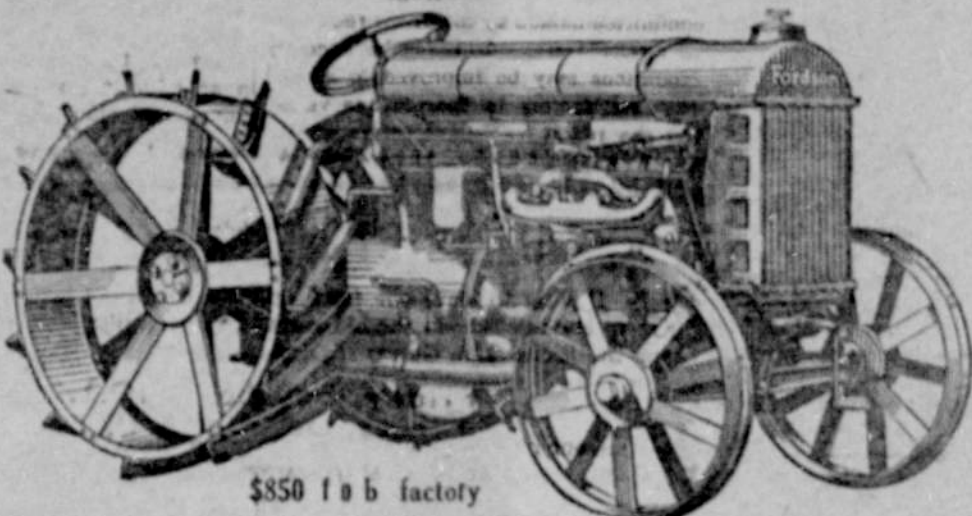

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, served a notice on the state highway department and state industrial accident commission that they would have to vacate their quarters in the statehouse soon after December 1 in order that committee rooms may be provided for the legislature, which convenes in January. Approximately 100 employees will be effected by the moving order, according to Mr. Koser.

The Oregon wheat crop this year is placed at 21,924,000 bushels, according to the September report issued by F. L. Kent, agricultural statistician of the bureau of crop estimates, United States department of agriculture. This is an increase of 1,529,000 bushels over the estimated crop of last year. Other increases shown in the report are 2,896,000 bushels of oats, 922,000 bushels of barley and 243,000 bushels of rye.

Residents of Bonanza have raised a fund for grading the road-bed for a branch of the Oregon, California & Eastern railway from the present terminus at Dairy, to Bonanza. Under agreement with Robert E. Strahorn, president of the road, the Bonanza people are to grade the road, furnish ties and provide the rights of way. The railway company will furnish and lay the rails. Bids for grading will be opened October 1.

By a decision rendered in the circuit court in Portland, Judge John McCourt dissolved an injunction brought by the county court of Polk county to restrain the state highway commission from proceeding with paving operations in that county over a contested route. The effect of the decision is to uphold the right of the highway commission to select the routing of highways or to change announced routes in its discretion.

Appropriation of 4000 second feet of water from the Klamath river for the development of 150,000 horsepower and irrigation of 250,000 acres of land is

the Sacramento valley at an estimated cost of \$15,000,000 is sought in an application filed with Percy Capper, state engineer, by Victor Demarada and Charles E. Watson. The main canal will divert water from the Klamath river in Oregon and carry it 60 miles into the Sacramento valley.

The Ashland city council has called two special elections for this month for the purpose of voting on proposed improvements in the city water supply. One proposal is to bond the city for \$100,000 to buy Buck lake, 25 miles east of Ashland. This will be passed upon September 23. The council then ordered another election September 18 for the purpose of voting on bonding the city for \$100,000 for erection of a dam near Mount Ashland, which, it is claimed, would conserve enough water for all purposes.

Young men and women of Lake county, who desire the advantages of higher education in state institutions in Oregon, may go to college for many years to come at no expense to themselves, according to the provisions of the will of the late Dr. Bernard Daly, an old-time citizen of Lake county. The board of trustees of the fund left by Dr. Daly found that more than \$700,000 is left by the will to be used to educate the young men and women of the county, which is very sparsely populated. Probably not more than 15 persons will be available to take advantage of this offer yearly, it is thought.

A bomb was thrown into the plans for the annual mobilization of the Oregon National Guard when a ruling was received by Adjutant General George A. White from the militia bureau of the war department requiring a minimum of 52 men per company in order to draw federal pay. Under this ruling no transfers of men from one company to another in order to meet the minimum requirement nor the consolidation of companies will be permitted. This means, Adjutant General White states, that, with two or three exceptions, none of the companies of the Fifth Oregon infantry regiment will attend the camp unless a special dispensation is secured modifying the ruling so as to permit the consolidation of companies as heretofore.

The transplanting of goat glands to the human body has been successfully performed in Portland in 34 instances, in all of which the patient has been made fully ten years younger in vitality and general good spirits. This was announced following a series of experimental operations performed by Dr. M. G. McCorkle, the experiments covering a period of ten months.

Olaf Anderson confessed to Coroner Hughes and Deputy Coroner Karlson of Clatsop county that he was responsible for his wife's death by drowning Saturday in the Columbia river near Tongue point. According to Coroner Hughes, Anderson admitted shoving his wife from the boat in which his wife and their 4-year-old son were riding.

Thousands of fine chinook salmon are going to waste in Rogue river because of the inability of the two canneries to handle the offerings. The fish are coming in such schools that the boats stay out but a short time when they pull up their nets and have more than the limit placed upon the deliveries. Several limits were made—first, as to fish, and, later, to pounds—as the fishermen throw away the small ones and delivered the larger fish, since it meant 12 cents for every pound. The last limit was made 800 pounds. The canneries are running short of cans.

Oregon republicans have raised and sent east a campaign fund of approximately \$20,000 according to a statement made by Thomas H. Tongue, Jr., chairman of the republican state central committee.

Approximately 40 industrial cripples receiving aid under the state industrial accident department have been assigned to various trade schools, business colleges and other institutions of learning in the state.

Conditions affecting aviation along the Oregon coast will be investigated and charted and photographs will be taken of landing points within the next ten days under supervision of the navy department.

More than 1500 members of the United Artisans from almost every section of Oregon, Washington and Idaho arrived in Salem Saturday night and Sunday to participate in the annual convention of the order.
