

CITY OF SCIO, OREGON

October 24, 1920.

At a regular adjourned meeting of the Council this day regularly called and held at the time and place and in the manner provided by law, with Mayor A. G. Prill, Recorder J. S. Sticha and the following members of the Council, to-wit: R. M. Cain, F. T. Thayer, Roy V. Shelton, John Wesely and W. J. Chrona in attendance, the following business was transacted:

Councilman F. T. Thayer then offered the following resolution, which was duly seconded and unanimously adopted, which resolution with the vote thereon is in words and figures as follows:

RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the council of the city of Scio, Linn county, state of Oregon, that the following proposed amendments to the charter of said city be and the same hereby are proposed for submission to the legal voters of said city for their adoption or rejection at the special city election to be held on the 23d day of October, 1920, as in this resolution provided;

Charter Amendments Submitted to the Voters by the Council.

An Act.

To amend an act entitled "an act to amend an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, approved October 24, 1896, and to amend an act entitled "an act to amend section 2 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved October 22, 1868, and to amend an act entitled "an act to amend section 6 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved October 22, 1874, and to amend "an act to amend sections 4, 5, 8, 14 and 16 of an act entitled 'an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 24, 1896, and to amend an act entitled 'an act to amend section 2 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 22, 1868, and to amend an act entitled 'an act to amend section 6 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 22, 1874," passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved January 28, 1891, and to amend the charter of the city of Scio," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city at the regular city election held therein on the 6th day of December, 1915, and to amend said charter as amended at the special election held in said city on the 23rd day of February, 1920, and to amend all other amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people.

Be it enacted by the people of the city of Scio that an act entitled "an act to amend an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, approved October 24, 1896, and to amend an act entitled "an act to amend section 2 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved October 22, 1868, and to amend an act entitled "an act to amend section 6 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio" passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved October 22, 1874, and to amend "an act to amend sections 4, 5, 8, 14 and 16 of an act entitled 'an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 24, 1896, and to amend an act entitled 'an act to amend section 2 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 22, 1868, and to amend an act entitled 'an act to amend section 6 of an act to incorporate the city of Scio' approved October 22, 1874," passed by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon and approved January 28, 1891, and to amend the charter of the city of Scio," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city at the regular city election held therein on the 6th day of December, 1915, as amended at the special election held in said city on the 23rd day of February, 1920, and as amended by all other amendments thereto enacted by the legislative assembly or by vote of the people be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto section 139 to read as follows:

Section 139. For the purpose of providing funds for making additions, extensions and betterments to the electric light and water plant of the city of Scio, the council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of general obligation bonds of said city in the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) said bonds to be in denominations of five hundred dollars (\$500) each, numbered 1 to 40 inclusive, duly signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder under the corporate seal of the city having semi-annual interest coupons attached thereto bearing the fac-simile engraved signature of the mayor and recorder, whereby the city shall be held in substance and effect to undertake and promise to pay the bearer of each said bond at maturity thereof the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum payable semi-annually, each of said bonds to be a direct general obligation of the city of Scio and to be known as City of Scio Water and Light Bonds, which said bonds shall be dated October 1, 1920, and shall mature without prior option October 1, 1925, principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the state of Oregon in New York City.

The bonds hereby authorized shall be sold by the council as in its judgment may be best.

The debt limitations contained in the charter of said city shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.

The council shall each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for city purposes include in such levy a sum

sufficient to pay interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue and to retire the principal amount thereof at maturity.

Resolved further that this resolution for proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the council be filed with the recorder of the city of Scio, for submission to the legal voters of said city, for their rejection or approval to be voted upon at a special election to be held as herein provided;

Resolved further that the council deem it advisable and does hereby and herein call and make necessary provision for the holding of a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 23rd day of October, 1920, between the legal voting hours on said date, and that said time be and the same hereby is designated as the time for holding said special election, and the City Hall in said city is hereby designated as the polling place therefor, and the following named persons are hereby designated and appointed as and for the judges and clerks of said election, to-wit: O. B. Cyrus and Claudia Gill, judges; Jennie Shelton and Vivian Bilyeu, clerks.

Resolved, further, that for the hereinabove proposed charter amendments, the following ballot title to be and the same hereby is adopted, to-wit:

Charter Amendments Submitted to the Voters by the Council

An Act

To amend the charter of the city of Scio as amended at the election held therein on December 6, 1915, and as subsequently amended at the election held therein on February 23, 1920, by adding section 139 providing for an issue of \$20,000 bonds of said city to provide funds for making additions, extensions and betterments to the city electric light and water plant, providing for the sale of said bonds and for the levy of a special tax to pay principal and interest thereon.

Be it further resolved that the recorder be and he is hereby instructed to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the council in the manner provided by law, that is to say, by publication of this resolution in full for two consecutive publications within the twenty days immediately preceding said special election in the Scio Tribune, same being a newspaper published in the city of Scio, and hereby designated for said purpose.

Passed by the council on this, the 2nd day of October, 1920, by the following vote: Yeas 5; Nays 0.

Reasons for the increase of cost of building the power plant over the original estimates is due to the following reasons which have developed since beginning work last April:

- Increase in the cost of labor 50 per cent.
- Increase in the cost of cement 90 per cent.
- Increase in the cost of machinery and supplies 50 per cent.
- Hauling due to the impassable roads 50 per cent.
- Change of Dam location, made necessary by being unable to secure a rock foundation, on the north side of the creek, has made an additional cost of \$5,000.00.

The work has been delayed, first by the inability to secure labor at any price and unable to secure cement until three months after ordered and delivery of supplies nearly three months after orders were placed.

Extra costs in securing right of way has also added to the expense and three stages of high water doing damage to the extent of \$500.00.


