

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Infor- mation of Our Readers.

U. S. Grant has been elected mayor of Dallas.

Heppner's new \$100,000 hotel will soon be open to the public.

The school house at Spray, Wheeler county, was totally destroyed by fire last week.

The 1929 tax roll shows a total valuation of \$37,174,369 for taxable property in Marion county.

Harney county at the recent election passed an initiative bill placing a 5-cent bounty on rabbits.

Assessment rolls for Coos county have been completed and show a total valuation of \$23,442,352.

Out of 361 students in a Salem school examined by the school nurse, 170 were found physically imperfect.

The total rainfall at Marshfield during the month of October was 10.14 inches, breaking all previous records.

With \$1100 on hand and a budget of only \$2000, Creswell will probably have the lowest tax rate of any town in the state.

The annual school budget of Medford, an increase of \$10,130 over last year's budget, was passed by a vote of 183 to 13.

The annual teachers' institute of Marion county will be held in the high school building in Salem, November 22, 23 and 24.

The Bend Commercial club closed its three days' membership campaign with a total of 356 members and pledges for a \$7500 service fund.

All the sheep have been moved out of the Wenaha forest reserve to lower levels. There is about six inches of snow in the reserve.

Nearly 150 farmers in the section south of Myrtle Point have presented a petition to the county court asking a \$50 bounty on coyote scalps.

The main building of the Albany Tanning company, one of Albany's leading industries, was destroyed by fire. The loss will exceed \$40,000.

Ex-service men attending the Oregon Agricultural college have reinstated their war risk insurance to the extent of \$290,000 since last April.

The second annual convention and show of the Western Walnut association will be held in Portland on Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

Threshing machines are still running on Basket mountain, east of Weston. It is expected that all the grain will be threshed by the end of the week.

The Alsea River Lumber company of Eugene, which recently completed a large sawmill at Glenbrook, has filed in the office of the Lane county clerk a trust deed to all its properties in Lane and Benton counties to secure a bond of \$500,000.

The lifeless body of Miss Edith Bartow, a student, was discovered in her room at Herrick hall, the girls' dormitory of Pacific university in Forest Grove. The young woman was found dead in bed with a towel saturated with chloroform about her head.

A movement has been launched at Salem to have the city council call a special election in the near future to vote on the question of authorizing bonds in the sum of \$25,000 with which to help defray the expenses of the city government during the next 12 months.

The Lane county court has issued an order, restricting the weight of loads to be hauled over the Mohawk valley road extending northeasterly from Eugene through Donna, Marcola and to Wendling. The order states that loads heavier than 2000 pounds will be prohibited.

Application for a 30 per cent increase in telephone rates was made by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company of Portland to the public service commission. If the increase is granted it will mean an increase of about \$1,200,000 a year in the revenue of the company.

A professional trapper will soon be sent by the state game department to several localities in Lane county to trap beaver that have been damaging property near their habitat. Many complaints have reached the game department from Lane county regarding depredations of beaver.

Acting upon requests from the secretary of state, warden of the state penitentiary, superintendent of the Oregon state industrial school for girls, and the secretary of the Oregon state board of control, Sam A. Koser, in charge of the state department, has issued a call for the state emergency board to meet in Salem November 22, to consider proposed deficiency appropriations aggregating \$55,544.22.

Action taken by the Lakeview chamber of commerce and promises by the Lakeview Box and Lumber company indicate a rosy future for Lakeview. The chamber of commerce voted to purchase a 50-acre tract of land adjoining the city limits as a site for the construction of a \$300,000 box factory. A committee was appointed to raise \$114,600 by popular subscription to purchase the site. J. E. Campbell, representing the company, has promised to return to the people of Lakeview the \$114,600, with 6 per cent interest, in case the mill was not in operation within two years. Besides a box factory, Lakeview will probably have a \$100,000 sash and door factory in the near future.

Doughnuts

3 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal
Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add
sugar and well-beaten
egg; stir in milk; add nut-
meg, salt, flour and bak-
ing powder which have
been sifted together and
enough additional flour to
make dough stiff enough
to roll. Roll out on floured
board to about 1/4-inch
thick; cut out. Fry in
deep fat hot enough to
brown a piece of bread in
60 seconds. Drain on un-
greased paper and sprinkle
with powdered sugar.

Crullers

4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons Royal
Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk

Cream shortening; add
sugar gradually and beat
in eggs; stir together
flour, cinnamon, salt and
baking powder; add one-
half and mix well; add
milk and remainder of
dry ingredients to make
soft dough. Roll out on
floured board to about 1/4-
inch thick and cut into
strips about 4 inches long
and 1/4-inch wide; roll in
hands and twist each
strip and bring ends to-
gether. Fry in deep hot
fat. Drain and roll in
powdered sugar.

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
