Then disarmament might have been possible. Now it is not. The world's wealth will continue to be devoted to war and preparation for war.

President Wilson now knows he blundered in not taking steps to placate the U. S. senate oligarchy. He should have placed the responsibility of the formation of the league equally upon republicans and democrats.

It does not seem possible that the league may yet be patched up, which only is feasible. A new league or association of nations would simply be child's play.
