

## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

### Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Infor- mation of Our Readers.

La Grande's budget for city expenses for the coming year is \$106,460.

With all preparations complete and everything in readiness for the intensive, state-wide canvass through which Oregon's \$250,000 quota of the \$33,000,000 national fund to be raised for the starving children in the war-swept areas overseas is to be raised by January 1, the European relief council officially opened its campaign Monday.

Jay H. Dobbin of Enterprise, president of the Oregon Wool Growers' association; Mack Hoke of Pendleton, secretary-treasurer, and C. C. Berkeley of Hay Creek, vice-president, were re-elected by acclamation at the closing of the 23d annual convention at Pendleton. The place for holding next year's convention will be named later by the executive committee.

Mining men representing practically all of the important mines in eastern Oregon met in Baker last week to consider means of meeting the present depressing conditions in the mining industry. Increased cost of production coupled with a permanent low selling price has proved to be a combination that cannot be coped with, and mining has practically come to a standstill.

Leslie Murray, defeated candidate for representative from Multnomah county at the primary election last May, has filed in the Marion county circuit court legal protest against the election of Herbert Gordon of Portland who was a successful candidate for the office. It was charged by Mr. Murray that Mr. Gordon's election was illegal for the reason that he was a candidate for two offices at the same election.

The habit of yelling fire when there was no fire almost cost Fred Worthington his life when the Eugene city jail, in which he was a prisoner, was partially destroyed by a blaze of undetermined origin. Worthington shouted for help and his cries were heard by the firemen in their sleeping quarters, which were close to the jail. The men thought the prisoner was trying to spread a false alarm, and rolled over in bed for another nap.

As a result of a quarrel at Wapinitia, east of The Dalles, Louis McCoy is nursing a knife wound in the shoulder, and Charles Delores, E. Barzee and V. Fitzpatrick are under arrest charged with assault with a deadly weapon. Delores is alleged by county police officers to have done the stabbing.

The Oregon single tax league has filed with the secretary of state a proposed constitutional amendment providing for single tax in this state. The amendment will go before the voters of Oregon at the general election in November, 1922, unless a special election is called before that date by an act of the legislature.

Application for permit to appropriate water has been filed in the office of the state engineer by M. F. Hanley of Medford, covering appropriation of water from the north fork of Little Butte creek for irrigation of 780 acres in Jackson county. It is estimated that the development will cost approximately \$44,000 and will consist of a power plant.

Measures having for their purpose the regulation of interstate traffic as it relates to the operation of motor vehicles and uniform laws for all the northwest states will be submitted to the legislatures of Washington, California, Oregon and Idaho, in case officials in charge of the automobile departments of these states comply with the request of Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, who in a letter issued Saturday urged a conference at an early date to decide upon regulations needed in handling the traffic situation.

Secretary of the Interior Payne advised Representative Sinnott Friday that some change will be made in the contract with the California-Oregon Power company for the construction of the Link-river dam at the outlet of Upper Klamath lake. A clarifying provision will be inserted, making clear the paramount right of the government to the water. In addition, the secretary of the interior has decided to approve the Sinnott bill which would permit the organization of a drainage district under the Oregon state law for the purpose of dyking several thousand acres of marsh lands in the same locality.

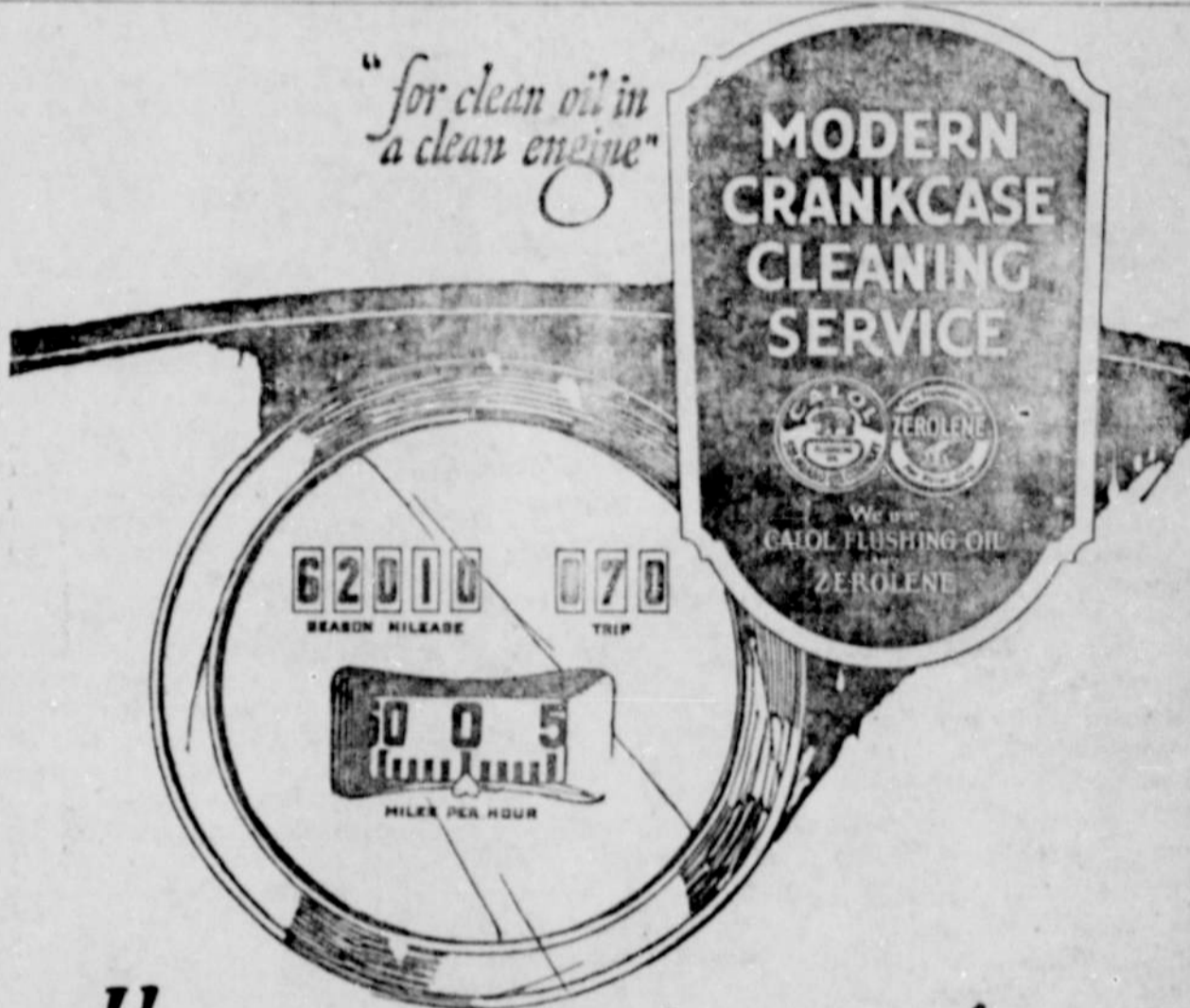
