Linn County Breeders Association Will Publish Directory.

The committee of the Linn County Breeder's Association on the publishing of a breeder's directory held a meeting April 4th at the county agent's office and made plans for the publishing of a directory. Letters will be sent out to former breeder association members asking them to send in their names together with the kind of pure bred livestock they are raising, or certified seed that they are growing.

It is hoped that every breeder of pure bred stock or certified seed will send in his name at once as the directory will go to press on May 1st and no names will be received after that time. Already there are eighty pure bred breeders who have listed their names for publication in this directory. No doubt it will be near twice this number. A membership fee of \$2.00 is charged for membership in this Association and those who wish their names to be entered in the directory must accompany the same with the \$2.00 fee. This directory will be distributed to county agents and breeders of livestock throughout the state and also to other states whenever information is desired relative to Linn County livestock, or certified seed.

The forest service will plant 450,000 trees in Oregon and Washington forest lands this spring, according to J. E. Kummel, in charge of reforestation for this district. The trees will cover 740 acres in the Rainier, Santiam and Crater national forest.

All but 200 of the China pheasant hens and 40 of the cocks raised at the state game farm near Eugene in the past season have been liberated in different parts of the state this spring. More than 2500 of the birds have been distributed where it is thought they will multiply rapidly.

In addition to funds proposed to be raised in Douglas county by the bonding measure recently indorsed by taxpayers, there will be approximately \$68,000 for market roads. At the November election a 1-mill tax was voted for market roads, which on a \$34,000,000 valuation, will provide \$34,000. The state will match this amount.

McMinnville is making an extension of its electric power line out "Three-Mile Lane," east of the city. Farmers' residences along the lane will be illuminated and power furnished those who wish it. The lane is being hard surfaced by the county. It is part of the West Dayton-McMinnville cutoff on the Pacific highway from Portland to McMinnville.
