

## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

### Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Infor- mation of Our Readers.

Hop picking will begin near Harrisburg about August 15.

Organization of the Clackamas County Pioneers' association has been effected.

The Cabbage Hill-Deadman's Pass road, a stretch of 12.8 miles on the Pendleton-La Grande road, has been finished.

Governor Olcott has promised to be present and speak at the dedication of the municipal aviation field at Eugene September 5.

Lana county will not produce one-fifth enough peaches for local consumption this year, according to the county fruit inspector.

Leland Smith of Portland, recently appointed to the consular service, has been assigned to the consulate of Saigon, French Indo-China.

Feed for cattle on the low lands of Josephine county is reported to be excellent. The cattle are in fine condition for this time of year.

Allen Johnston, 9 years old, whose parents live in Portland, was drowned in the Columbia river at Rainier when he was caught in a whirlpool.

A. L. Parker, an employee of the Crown Willamette Paper company, was drowned in the Willamette river at Oregon City while bathing.

Fourteen hundred pounds of molasses and 100 pounds of arsenic were sent to Crane Prairie last week to be used as poison for grasshoppers.

Approximately one-third of Umatilla county's 1921 wheat crop, or about 2,000,000 bushels, already has been contracted, the prices ranging near \$1.

The first crop of 1921 barley threshed in Lane county this year yielded 50 bushels to the acre. It was grown on the ranch of Ralph Coon, of Junction City.

The Union Oil company of California has remitted to the secretary of state \$17,766.48, covering the tax on sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for June.

J. E. Enyart, a former Medford banker, is promoting a company to construct an aerial system to transport tourists from the rim of Crater lake to the lake surface.

Harrisburg hop men are selling out last year's crop as low as 11 cents a pound. This time last year they refused 40 and 45 cents and later in the summer as high as 65 cents.

Work on the Oregon central military wagon road from the Rigdon ranch, 75 miles south of Eugene, to the summit of the Cascades will be completed by the last of this week.

The shortage in Umatilla county road funds due to alleged peculations for which K. C. Amann, clerk in the roadmaster's office, was arrested, will amount to between \$3000 and \$4000.

Jail sentences aggregating about a year, and fines totaling more than \$1500 were the results of recent activities of operatives of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league in Marion county.

C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, reports that labor conditions have improved somewhat during the past few weeks, due to the demand for workers on farms and in the fruit industry.

A. P. Davis, director of the reclamation service, will pass several days in eastern Oregon in August, visiting the Powder river irrigation project August 21 and 22, and the Deschutes project later.

Approximately seven miles of white guard rails will be built on all sharp curves and deep fills on state highways in Umatilla county leading to Pendleton before Round-Up time late in September.

With the lumber mills fast getting back to normalcy in production and a consequent reduction in prices of lumber, the outlook for home construction in Baker is more favorable than for three or four years.

Fire in Brooks-Scanlon slashings along The Dalles-California highway, 13 miles south of Bend, caused so intense a degree of heat that automobile tourists were able to drive through only with the greatest difficulty.

The Oregon Wool & Mohair Growers' association has announced the shipment of ten carloads of market lambs from valley counties as the result of an order for 10,000 breeding lambs which it was asked to fill.

That the body found in the Brumfield auto wreck near Roseburg was

that of W. Dennis Russell and that he met his death by gunshot wounds inflicted by a person unknown, was the verdict returned by a coroner's jury last week.

Orders were received at Eugene to move all of the airplanes and men stationed at the base of the forest fire patrol at Medford to the main base at Eugene and all patrols over the state will start from the Eugene flying field. Gasoline stations will continue to be maintained at Medford and Portland.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon has agreed to approve the China trade act sponsored by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, for separate legislative action prior to and independent of the general revenue revision bill.

Members of Bend, Redmond and Primeville lodges of the Woodmen of the World will hold a joint session in Redmond Saturday evening, August 6, to initiate large classes resulting from the central Oregon membership campaign now on.

Word has been received at Dallas that Joseph Dennis, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Dennis, Oakdale farmers, who is serving in the American army of occupation in Germany, was cited recently for bravery for preventing an explosion.

Under the direction of the American Legion post, Bend will celebrate clean-up day, July 31, at Shavlin park, the tract in Tumslo canyon recently donated to the city by the Shavlin-Hixon company. Volunteer labor will put the park in order.

The month of June marked a new record in the business transacted by the state corporation department, according to announcement made by T. D. Handley, state corporation commissioner. The cash receipts of the office for the month were \$113,000.

Reports are current at Salem that E. S. Evenden, now assistant to Dr. Strayer, head of the department of education of Columbia university, probably will be offered the presidency of the state normal school at Monmouth to succeed J. H. Ackerman.

A band of 60 elk is reported to have been seen in the neighborhood of Trout Meadows in Baker county, by members of the Whitman forest service. A report has been made to the state game commission, and every effort will be made to protect the elk.

The 1600 members of the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers association met last week in the various districts throughout the state to elect the permanent board of 16 district directors. Directors are elected by districts in proportion to the number of sheep signed.

The Willamette Valley Southern railway, through its traffic manager, has filed an application with the Oregon public service commission asking that it be allowed to put into effect reduced week-end rates between points on its lines and Portland and Oregon City.

Reduction of naval appropriations will make it impossible for the government to assign the historic battleship Oregon to the state this year at federal expense, according to a letter from Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, received by George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon.

Based upon the indebtedness of the state and its political subdivisions, aggregating \$107,490,533.54, as reported to Governor Olcott by Frank Lovell, state tax commissioner, the annual interest that must be paid to keep these obligations in good standing will exceed \$6,370,000.

For the first time in several years it is reported that cattle again are being poisoned by larkspur in Union county. Several members of the Summerville Livestock association have suffered the loss of several cattle on the reserve, most of the dead cattle being found near Five Point creek.

Eight hundred and sixty-three acres of Indian lands on the Umatilla reservation of an appraised value of \$88,820, will be placed on sale September 18, according to Superintendent E. L. Swartzlander of the Indian agency. The land is divided into 15 parcels, none exceeding 50 acres and none less than 25 acres of land.

Robert Grant, who escaped from the state penitentiary at Salem March 27, 1920, was captured at Wenatchee, Wash., and will be returned to Salem to serve out his unexpired term. Grant originally was received at the prison from Umatilla county to serve four years on a charge of burglary.
