GOODBYE

Men and women grow old and have to abandon life's activities. They lose their vigor and "Pep." They may think they are too young to be placed on the retired list, but they are mistaken. He is required to haul down his flag from the mast of the flag-ship for the final time. His sphere of usefulness closes, so says a law of congress.

I have tried to serve the people of Scio and vicinity in a modest way as editor and publisher of the Scio newspaper for 31 years, with the exception of a few years. Whether I have done well or ill, my readers must decide. But this service has ever been to build up Scio and vicinity and make it a more prosperous community. I think my enemies will admit this fact and I know my friends will.

No doubt in my modest career as editor I have made mistakes—have said things that had better not been said, and left unsaid things I should have said. I am imperfect, the same as all are. For these mistakes I cheerfully ask pardon, and for the good things I may have said I know my friends will remember me kindly therefor.

When I came to Scio I was a vigorous man of middle age; my family were all living. I entered into the activities of business in Scio with joy and zeal. I wanted to do things in a modest way to push Scio ahead. Both success and failure has resulted. But for everything which aimed for the prosperity of Scio I have

tried to be on the side of right and justice. Now I am an old man, bowed down with decrepitude. I have followed each member of my family to the quiet home of the mortal body in Franklin Butte cemetery, but I feel that their spirits live in the Great hereafter and that we soon will meet again.

Mr. I. V. McAdoo, who succeeds me as editor and publisher, comes to our town well recommended. Mechanically, he knows the printing business thoroughly, and editorially I believe he is a man of ability. He assumes complete charge next week. I know he is energetic, affable and honest. I feel that I am leaving The Scio Tribune in capable hands, and I hope the many patrons of the paper will give him the same cordial support you have given me, for the more generous the support you give him the better newspaper he will be able to make.

IMPORTANT WESTERN BILL

Senator McNary has introduced and secured favorable report in the senate on his bill to secure federal and state cooperation in reclamation of public lands. The bill appropriates \$250,000,000 to enable ex-service men to get not to exceed 160 acres of public lands, provides for irrigation and construction of homes and amortized payments covering a period of 20 years.

It is a scientific piece of legislation from the standpoint of lawmaking and finance. After 5 years \$50,000,000 a year is to be returned to the treasury, and there are no loopholes for monopoly or exploitation. Such an act would be a deserved recognition of the younger generation that enlisted or were drafted to fight for our country and the world in the greatest crisis of modern times. It should become a law if it will do what Senator McNary intends it shall do.

The following item is of interest only so far as it shows the unselfish loyalty of the community to the little home paper, and is taken from the Aurora Observer: "In a small town not so very far from here a weekly paper was dying. The editor had announced the last issue to appear. Lack of business was the cause. The farmers wanted the community news; they wanted a weekly home paper; they occasionally had fruit, grain, implements or stock they wanted to advertise for sale. So they agreed and 200 farmers pledged \$10 a year each, in advertising, besides the subscriptions. Two thousand dollars a year from farmers! The paper will stick! It is the Florence West." Florence is on the Pacific coast in Lane county.

A court in Detroit, Mich., has just fined a man \$50 for stealing 10c from a newsboy. He might be rated as the meanest man in the world. Nothing is said about the boy getting his dime back, but he was vindicated—the municipality got \$50, because the man had \$90 on his person, and the boy is still out his dime.

If all the employees of the state could be located in one spot, a city of 3400 people would result. Assuming that each constituted an average family of four people, the city would then be 13,600. No wonder the cost of our state government is high.

Work has been started on the Benham Falls reservoir in Deschutes county. This is a government project, and when completed will irrigate thousands of acres of very fertile soil in that part of Eastern Oregon.
