Telltale Auto Lights

A speed indicator that will give passers-by an idea of about how fast an automobile is being driven has been invented by a Californian. The speed-teiling device is attached to a prominent part of the radiator or to a front fender, and gets its operating power from one of the front wheels through a flexible shaft.

The speed indicator is a governorlike device that causes various colored lights to flash as respective rates of speed are reached. When the car is being run conservatively white lights are shown; but should the driver exceed the average speed allowed by cities, a green light will shine and probably draw the unwelcome attention of a traffic officer.

The most radical signal is the red flash, which means that the driver has flung caution to the winds. Once the red light blazes forth it must burn until the motorist stops his car and turns a switch that is built into the instrument.
