Tunnel That Helped to Dig Itself.

In the Sumpson tunnel under the Alps, which is by far the greatest tunnel in the world, the quantity of water flowing out of the southern end, from the many veins encountered in the heart of the mountain, amounted to 15,000 gallons a minute, and furnished sufficient power to compress the air by which the drills were worked, and to refrigerate the tunnel. The necessity for refrigeration may be judged from the fact that the heat in the deeper parts of the tunnel rose as high as 150 degrees Fahrenheit when not artificially reduced.

"Sporting One's Oak."

"To sport one's oak" is a phrase signifying that one is not at home with visitors.
