

## Clothing Prices Show Greatest Drop

Clothing Prices have shown the greatest decline since peak prices of July 1920, which time the tide turned and prices of all commodities sought lower levels. The National Industrial Conference Board has just completed a nation wide survey of the five general items entering into the average family budget — food, shelter, clothing, fuel and light. The report shows a drop in clothing prices of 78% in food 32%; rent 7% increase, fuel and light 8% increase, during the period from July 1920 to July 1921.

More than 1800 returned soldiers have been placed on 420,000 acres of land in the Regina, Saskatchewan, area by the Soldiers' Settlement Board. In this area of almost half a million acres the Board has an investment of \$8,500,000, of which more than half is charged to the price of the land. The stock and equipment of these soldiers are valued at \$2,000,000.

### County Paragraphs

Rumors flew thick and fast among the leading business houses of the county seat last Saturday that the First National Bank of Albany had changed hands. This was stoutly denied by the bank officials. It was said that a San Francisco capitalist had taken over the entire interest of the bank from the Flynn estate.

W. G. M. Smith, who lives in the Larwood district, is showing some fine samples of Franquet Walnuts grown on his farm this year. The nuts are much larger than the ordinary and is a strong indication that the soil of eastern Linn county equals that of northern Yamhill county, which is said to be the leading center of Oregon in the production of nuts.

Following an illness from nervous troubles, Dr. Isaac B. Wilson, a former resident of Sweet Home, died at a hospital in Bend, on Sunday, Oct. 9, at the age of 38 years. He enlisted in the services of his country during the late war, was assigned to Fort Riley, Kan., in the medical division, and rose to the rank of lieutenant. After his discharge, he resumed practice at La Pine, Deschutes county, and answered all calls when his health would permit. He was a member of the American Legion, and was buried under the auspices of the Lebanon Legion post with military honors, Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 12. Rev. G. E. Williams delivering the funeral sermon. Burial was had in Gillian cemetery. The remains were accompanied from Bend by Howard Holmes, a member of the Bend post. The deceased is survived by his mother, Mrs. Eva Wilson, of Sweet Home.
