FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Little Bits of Information From the

O. A. C. of Benefit to the

Farmer and Orchardist

As trees come into bearing and increase in size the orchardist should not fail to add to his spray equipment as needed so as to insure complete protection with the full spray schedule applied on time. Much loss occurs from hasty work and delayed applications where inadequate spray machinery is used.

How many pigs can one expect to raise on the skim milk from one cow? If the cow is an average producer or better, one pig to each cow is not a bad standard. Under ordinary conditions 300 to 350 lbs. of skimmed milk or butter milk will replace 100 pounds of grain in the ration. It should not be fed alone, however, because of its watery bulk, but at the rate of 3 to 4 lbs. of milk to one of grain.

Lambing time will soon be here. It is well to consider the importance of docking and castrating the lambs early in life. When the lamb is but a few days old this is most easily done. A loss of from 25c to \$1 a head will result if animals are marketed without this being attended to.

Manure for spring application on the vegetable garden should be thoroughly composted now, that is, turned over, shaken up, and made to rot as thoroughly as possible. It should not be exposed to the winter rains, nor should it be hauled out to the garden now because of the necessity of keeping it off of land that is at all heavy. Soil which has manure covering it all winter is likely to dry out slowly in the spring because of the mulch formed. Such land is usually late in becoming ready for planting.

OREGONIANS MAKE RECORD

J. J. Handsaker Finds Oregon Workers In Many Armenian Towns.

"Oregonians are making a record in the Near East of which the State will be proud, once the story is known," says J. J. Handsaker, State Director. "During my summer in Armenia I did not visit a town where there was not an Oregonian at work, or some mark of an Oregonian's doings. At Derindje I found a hut made of packing boxes which I had shipped. At Trebizond, Nellie Cole of Forest Grove, was striving to stem the flood of refugees caused by the Greek and Turkish war. Margaret (Dollie) Hinman of Forest Grove, was in Constantinople, having been expelled from the interior. At Alexandropol we left Mrs. Ethel Long Newman, O. A. C. '20, in charge of the office where there are 7,000 orphan boys. At Erivan I met Nvart Gurdjian, for whom Frances Gage of Portland laid down her life three years ago. Mrs. Amy Burt of Bend told me of how she had rescued 1,600 children at one time.

"I hope to visit every part of the State to tell the story of these heroic Oregonians."

Near East American Workers Stick.

"American workers are sticking to their posts in the Near East against the greatest of odds," said J. J. Handsaker on his return from a summer in relief work in Armenia. "They declare they will not leave until every child in Armenia is cared for. Last year for a time we were obliged to put our orphanages on half and quarter rations, and thousands of our children died. When I was in Armenia last summer the children were in rags, some had practically nothing on, others wore grain sacks or flour sacks. Then it was warm, but as Mount Ararat towers above the country, I realized that before long those rags will be of no use, and they must have warm clothing."

Money of Ancient Britons.

Sword-shaped bars of iron were used by the ancient Britons as money, and many of these are now found in British museums. A recent investigation shows that six different denominations were used, distinguished by their size.
