## COMMERCIAL CLUB NEEDED IN SCIO

With Lack of Head to Look After  
Interests of City and Community, We Are Losers

It sometimes takes a pretty hard jolt for a city or community to wake up to its losses, and this has happened to Scio within the last two or three weeks in such a manner that everyone should sit up and take notice.

A few weeks ago, it is said, the owners of the phone system around Crabtree came to Scio and asked that they be allowed to connect with the Scio Mutual, the secretary was seen, who referred them to the president, who gave them no encouragement. The committee then went to Lebanon, with the result that immediate steps were taken for their connection, which has been made.

This is a direct loss to Scio, a loss that cannot be measured with any degree of accuracy. It means that businessmen lose a large amount of business by phone, that Scio Mutual loses some 40 more phones, that we are asleep at our post, and that something must be done to capture all that rightfully belongs to us. There will be other things happening that will need attention and quickly, and there is no better way than through a local organization, Scio's business men should take steps for some sort of organization that will be on the job all the time and now is the opportune time to get busy. Lets wake up, and show the world we are wide awake and the entire community wants every legitimate business that is to be had. Let the mayor or some one in authority call a meeting of the citizens and organize for Scio and do it now. Tomorrow may be late, as it was with the Crabtree phone.
