BOOSTS, BUT TRADES ELSEWHERE

Scio, Oregon, Dec. 31, 1921.

To the Editor:

Dear Sir: I read with great interest your article on trading or buying at home in this week's issue of your valuable paper, and must say it hits the nail on the head. If every one in this community would do that it would be the most prosperity of any community in the whole state.

Now, Mr. Editor, I believe I can give good reasons for my lack of patronizing Scio's business men, and it is quite probable many others have the same reason, though I do not know. I live reasonably close to Scio, I have always been a cash customer, and patronized Scio merchants. About two years ago I began taking an Albany paper, and I began to read the advertisements, and knowing the prices I was paying in Scio, I discovered I could go to Albany and make my purchases and save as high as 40 per cent on some articles, such as pancake flour and syrup, while on coffee of a leading brand I could save 10c and 15c per pound. On all other goods I save about the same per cent, especially dry goods and wearing materials. I know before I ever start to town what I want and what I have to pay for each article. That saved me time while in Albany and also saved the clerk time, while I would come to Scio and have to ask the price of every article I wished to buy. I have been trading in Albany for about two years, and I am ahead several dollars. I also buy all my gasoline in Albany, because I can save from 1½c to 2c a gallon.

I read the advertisements in your paper every week, and so far I have seen no prices on articles of food, and as the price is the dominant factor in my making purchases, it seems to me that Scio's business men should invite patronage through attractive price quotations each week, just as Albany, Salem and other communities.

Pardon me, dear editor, for this long letter, but as your paper is working hard to bring about a community of interest to each other, I just wanted to give what I considered the greatest barrier with a hope that all could come together and make Scio a great trading center.
