SUMMONS

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you are hereby required to appear in the above entitled court and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause, on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons in The Scio Tribune, the date of the first publication thereof being Thursday, the 5th day of January, 1922, and the date of the last publication being Thursday, the 16th day of February, 1922, to-wit: On or before the 20th day of February, 1922, and if you fail to so appear and answer said complaint, for want thereof, Plaintiff will apply to the Court for judgment and decree against said defendants, and for the relief prayed for and demanded in complaint herein, which is substantially as follows, to-wit:

For a decree of this Court adjudging and decreeing that there is due and owing to plaintiff on the \$850.00 promissory note described in plaintiff's complaint herein the sum of \$850.00, together with interest thereon from the 1st day of July, 1920, at the rate of eight per cent. per annum, until paid, and the further sum of \$100.00 attorney's fees herein and the costs and disbursements of this suit; that the mort-

gage described in said complaint and executed by John Bringard, deceased, to Jennie Wolfe, now deceased, and which mortgage bears date the 27th day of March, 1912, and is duly recorded at page 95 of Vol. 55, Record of Mortgages in and for Linn County, Oregon, and which mortgage was duly assigned by the said Jennie Wolfe, on or about the 22nd day of January, 1915, to the plaintiff herein, which assignment is duly recorded in Vol. 74, at Page 52, Record of Mortgages in and for Linn County, Oregon, be foreclosed and that each and all of the above named Defendants and all persons claiming by, through or under them, or either of them, subsequent to the execution of said mortgage, either as purchaser, incumbrancers or otherwise, be barred and foreclosed of all right or claim, save only the equity of redemption, in or to the said real property described in said mortgage, which said real property is described as follows:
