Winter Motoring Can Be Made More Pleasant by Giving Car Necessary Care.

WATCH ENGINE VERY CLOSELY

food and Radiator Should Be Kept Covered and Anti-Freeze Solution Poured Into Water System-Be Easy on Battery

With the closed car and all sorts of heating arrangements more popular than ever, few automobiles are put into storage during the winter.

But manufactured conveniences will ot make winter motoring pleasant unless the car gets all the attention and care necessary for cold-weather driving.

Chief Source of Trouble.

The motorist's greatest attention. hould be paid toward the engine, for that is his chief source of trouble in winter. He should keep the hood; and radiator covered. The gasoline should be cleared of water and other impurities and an anti-freeze solution; slaced in the water system.

The best anti-freeze solution is bout a gallon of denatured alcohol, or alcohol and glyceria in equal proportions, to three of water. This freezes at about 10 degrees above zero, Fahrenheit. For colder weather the alcohol mixture should be greater.

If the engine doesn't start immediately on depressing the starter button, the motorist should resort to the priming and crank method. The bat-Oleson - Rookstool tery should not be overworked, for the long nights and short days during winter mean added current for the lights. Besides, the battery's efficiency is lowered with a drop in tempera-

> Starting Cold Engine. A cold engine will start best after being primed with high-test gasoline or ether. The crank should be used to limber up the engine. The choke should be used sparingly, for overuse causes the raw fuel to run through nto the crank case.

> There is least load on the engine n starting if the clutch is held out while turning over the engine with he starting motor.

> Lighter lubricant should be placed n the differential and transmission. 'or cold weather congeals the oil and graishes more work for the engine.

OOSE SPOKES CAUSE NOISE

queaks Become More Distinct as Car Turns Corner and Can Be Remedied Quickly.

Wooden wheels with loose spokes mit a squeaking sound which is inensely annoying. The noise will be nore distinct when the car is being iriven around a corner. Sometimes Ms looseness may be obviated by replacing one or more spokes, or it may be cured by forcing small wooden wedges between the spokes and the hub. A wheelwright can do the ob in a few minutes.

Gloving the Tongue.

A glove for the tongue has been patented by an inventor of Inciana. It is called a "tongue shield," and is designed to enable the wearer to escape the unpleasantness of castor oil or other bad-tasting medicines. The contrivance might be said to have the shape of a miniature slipper without any heel portion, but when placed over the tongue is inverted. The tongue is inserted into the "toe" part and the back part of the "sole" extends over the top of the tongue toward the throat. The device is made of thin rubber, so as to be liquid proof, and is so constructed as to fit the tongue snugly without discomfort. CAPABLE DRIVER FOR AUTOMOBILE

Skilled Mechanic With Knowledge of Rules and Customs of Road Is Great Need

MUST KNOW ROAD MATERIALS

Should Be Observant and Realize That Children on Wagons Drop Off Suddenly-Standard of Conduct le Set High.

A motorcar needs a driver who is a skillful mechanic, and it also needs a driver who is skillful in manipulating a car on the road. An excellent me chanle is not necessarily a good driver What is required in a driver besides a general knowledge of his machine is a knowledge of the rules, customs and courtesies of the road and the habits of traffic, also the possession of the qualities of alertness, foresight and a consideration for others. He should have a temperate frame of mind and an abstinence from even moderate

Needs Be Best Driver.

The motorcar driver needs to be the best driver on the highway, if he is to crive without offence to the public and danger to others and himself, for he has to conduct a vehicle which is more valuable than any other and more speedy.

The complete driver should have working knowledge of the different materials of which roads are made, of their comparative tendency to cause skidding and of the perils which arise from badly laid street car tracks. He must be observant and realize that children hanging on rear of wagons are apt to drop off suddenly and run across his path. He should also know how to read a road map.

He must be on the lookout for pe destrians, stupid, drunk or deaf, for wagons on the wrong side of the dangerous corners and be prepared to find vehicles in charge of sleepy drivers who will often do the wrong act on being aroused. Those drivers who have had long practice in the city streets generally have arrived at expertness through training plus the hard school of practical everyday experfences assisted by public supervision and the fear of the results of ac

A good driver must know the proper way to drive his car around a corner both right-handed and left handed, and the best way to ascend and descend steep grades. Driving at night is another fine art. There is probably greater need for the exercise of patience in driving at night than at any other time.

The driver of an automobile has a large responsibility. The standard of conduct set for him is high. He must possess exceptional qualities as compared with the driver of horses. That he keep in mind and practice the Golden Rule is no small part of his job. In this is involved most of his qualifications as a driver.
