uation, but seldom calling the student body into conference with them, and when a member of the council wanted to know anything about the progress, they were met with the words "your ideas are too big" and "it can't be done."

Have any plans been submitted to the public by the committee? Has the committee explained in a conciliatory manner what was best and thus hold the confidence of the council and the bondholders. A statement that it can't be done is vague, carries no argument and is ambiguous in that nothing constructive is advanced. Give the council and public something definite, and then go ahead with the construction. As it now is the committee probably is saving money on the front end of the building but scooping it out by the shovelful at the backend—losing more in the present plan of procrastinating than the fondest dream or the most wild theory of any student.

We said "scooping out by the shovelful" and we mean it. Many men were willing and ready to donate from one to six days work on the construction, and this in the aggregate would probably mean anywhere from \$500 to \$1000. Now, labor may have to be employed at good wages—thus the scooping out at the back door what it is thought is saving at the front.

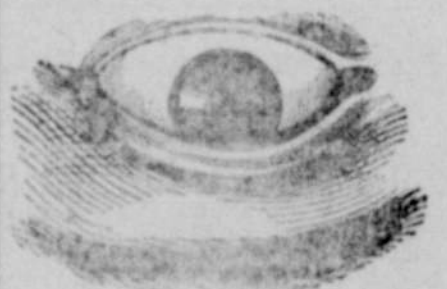
