Nolan, Ralph McDonald, Geo. Griffin, W. H. McLain, R. M. Cain and John Shimanek. The committee met at the home of H. E. Tobie on Monday night, and their draft will be presented at the next meeting.

The committee wishes to express its gratitude to Mrs. N. C. Lowe, of Lebanon, who gave a beautiful solo and encore, also to Mrs. E. G. Arnold, who played the accompaniment, but were disappointed in the failure of Rev. J. C. Spencer, who was unable to come, because of illness, and H. A. Howard, because of business matters, to be present.

Mr. Duryea has promised to return for the next meeting and bring with him two or three auto loads of club boosters. It is also probable a delegation will come from Albany, Lebanon and other points, so it will be a big day for the club and the people of this community.

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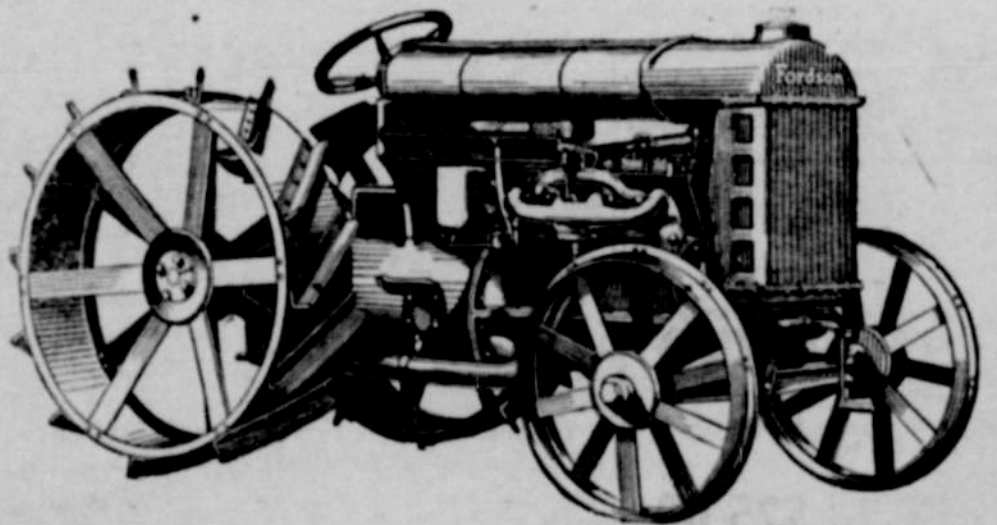
