

Community Club Meeting Saturday P. M. 200 MILE TRIP

THE meeting of the Forks of the Santiam Community Club for next Saturday, June 3, at the Z. C. B. J. hall at 2 o'clock p. m., will be the closing chapter in the final and complete organization of the Club. At this meeting officers for the ensuing year will be elected, and also the adoption of the by-laws, which has been prepared by the committee and is published below.

There has been unusual commendations heard everywhere for the club, and those who have been active in club work say it is the only way to get a community before the people—in fact, a solid community for a given program inspires confidence in that community by the stranger who is looking for an investment or a home. The club also has its opportunities in inviting the tourists to pass this way, to see our beautiful surroundings and the wonderful productivity of our soil. This latter is commendable advertising and "seeing is believing."

The clubs at Lebanon, Albany and other places have been invited to be present and no doubt some members will be present. The program of the club is very comprehensive and is designed to meet the needs of each section of the community. In fact, no one section is favored above another as each have the same problems to solve. The success of the club will depend upon the officers—if they are alive and active, all members will be solidly back of them; if they are inactive, the death of the club is inevitable.

Read the following by-laws, which will be presented for consideration, changes or adoption, and be here Saturday afternoon:

Tentative By-Laws

ARTICLE I.

Section 1—Name. The name of the organization shall be the "Forks of the Santiam Community Club."

Sec. 2—Purpose. The purpose of this organization is the development of the community.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1—Membership. Any person of good character over 16 years of age (in the community) shall be eligible to membership.

Sec. 2—Dues. Dues shall be twenty-five (25) cents per month for each male person, payable monthly in advance to the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1—Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of one person from each voting precinct in the Forks of the Santiam. Each precinct shall have the right to elect its own representative on the Board of Directors. Should any precinct fail to elect its Director or fail to fill any vacancy which might occur, the Board of Directors reserves the right to appoint a representative from said precinct. Directors shall serve for one year. The president of the organization shall be ex-officio chairman of the Board of Directors. A two-thirds vote of the members present has power to repeal any ruling of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall constitute the executive committee.

Sec. 2—Officers. Officers shall be a President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer, to be elected by the members at the annual meeting.

Sec. 3—President. The duties of the President shall be to preside over all meetings, appoint all special committees, and act as ex-officio chairman of the Board of Directors.

Sec. 4—Vice-President. The duties of Vice-President shall be to act as chairman in the absence of the President.

Sec. 5—Secretary-Treasurer. The duties of the Secretary-Treasurer shall

be to keep full minutes of all regular and special meetings, to attend to all correspondence for the organization, to collect all dues and pay out monies on orders signed by the President.

ARTICLE IV.

MEETINGS.

Annual meetings shall be held on the 1st Saturday in June of each year, place of meeting to be determined at the annual meeting of the previous year. Special meetings are subject to the call of the President, ten per cent of the members to constitute a quorum. In case the President refuses to call a meeting, five members of the organization, thru the Secretary, may call a special meeting, notice to be given to members ten days in advance.

ARTICLE V.

AMENDMENTS.

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present at any meeting, provided notice of proposed change shall have been sent each member prior to such meeting, or shall have been presented in writing at a meeting held at least ten days previous to date of action.

ARTICLE VI.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER.

The proceedings of the association meetings shall be covered by and conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Manual of Parliamentary Rules.

SUGGESTED PROGRAM

1. Work for strict economy in taxation.
2. Uphold the community's interests politically.
3. Advertise the community's resources.
4. Promote the milk industry.
5. Secure better marketing facilities.
6. Develop a broad program of education.

In every city and village one notices new residences and business blocks in course of erection, remodeling and painting and other evidences of returning prosperity. In Salem we were informed that the Oregon Growers Association began selling prunes Saturday and by closing time 80 carloads was the record for the first day. We were also informed that 11c was the top price. Pretty good for one day and means money for circulation in the valley this fall.

Hrudka Mill Burns

About 6 o'clock Tuesday morning the men at the Hrudka mill, about two and a half miles south of town, phoned in for help to put out a fire. They believed that it started about three o'clock in the morning from the engine, but did not spread fast.

In a short time after the alarm was given about 25 men were on hand to fight the blaze, and found that moving the carriages and part of the burning lumber was about all that could be done, and in a short time the fire was under control.

Not much damage was done, although it will require quite a little work to get the burned places cleared up and a new drag belt will be needed. The engine was not damaged so far as is known, and is still in use.

U.S. Supreme Court Decisions During May

WHEN our highest tribunal will reverse itself in two decisions on the same day, it is small wonder that the minds of men untrained in legal procedure go radical. Read this and think:

MAY 15 DECISION AFFECTING CHILD LABOR.

The federal child labor law violates states rights, says the United States supreme court, which has declared the law unconstitutional. The act levied a tax of 10 per cent on the profits of concerns that employed children under the age of 14.

Four years ago congress attempted to debar from interstate commerce the products of child labor, but the supreme court vetoed the act.

MAY 15 DECISION AFFECTING PROFITS.

States rights was overlooked when the United States supreme court ruled that a gas rate of 80 cents per 1,000 feet, passed by the New York legislature, is confiscatory and therefore illegal.

The decision means that gas companies in the vicinity of New York City can retain \$10,000,000 which was deposited by customers pending a final decision by the highest court.

John Chrz Passes

On Monday afternoon while working in the garden, death claimed one of our most esteemed and worthy citizens as its own and he was taken to his reward. He had not been feeling well for some time, but it was not thought that he was in danger, and that death would result so suddenly.

Mr. Chrz was born in Zrvkove, Zecho-Slavok (Bohemia), on December 5th, 1857 and died on May 29th 1922, aged 64 years, 4 months and 24 days.

Mr. Chrz had been a resident of this community for a number of years and his frankness and gentlemanly conduct had won many friends. One May 3, 1911, his wife passed away and he had almost since made his home with Ed, his son, on the old home place.

Five children survive the deceased as follows: Ed and Charles Chrz, and Mrs. Anna Stepanek, Mrs. Mary Beran and Mrs. Fannie Kalina, and also one brother, Antone Chrz, who lives at Glenville, Minn., and a sister in the old country.

Funeral services were held at the Franklin Butte cemetery yesterday, Rev. J. J. Canoles, of Lebanon, delivering a short address.

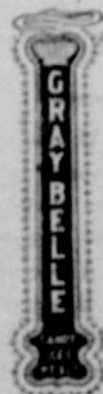
