COMMISSIONER THOMS will now have the opportunity to show that he knows how to transact business for the public, and he will make good. The old regime is dead, and new practices will prove their worth.

"NATIONAL Clean-up Day" has been set for Saturday, July 8. That is good, and may every community fall in line. But the best clean-up will probably occur on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

This week several of our merchants are offering bargains to our readers which are worth while. Watch their windows for them, and then come to Scio, Saturday, June 3, for the Community meeting and to do your trading.

WITH the primay out of the way and the weather also looking like it had also righted itself, our basic industry—lumbering—ought to be able to resume operation. No one can work good with such 'elevating' stories emanating from the various candidates, or while the crops were an uncertainty.

WHITE made a poor showing for the way he was touted. The history of our country since the civil war has been to taboo all military men from political positions, and it is right. Military men will always be military, and we have too much militarism as it is. Grant was the exception, and he was big enough and broad enough not to use his training in politics.

Of course you are planning on coming to Scio next Saturday! The program for the existence of the Forks of the Santiam Community club will be presented and officers elected. ALONG comes the United States supreme court and knocks out the Capper-Tincher future trading bill designed to prevent the "extremes" in wheat gambling. The court, in an opinion to which Justice Brandies dissented, declared the important parts of the law unconstitutional. Oh, well! There's no need to worry. The law didn't have enough kick to make it worth while fighting for. The Producer repeats: There is only one way to outlaw gambling in wheat and that is to substitute a

more efficient system of distribution for the one now in effect. Cooperation, not law, is the thing.—The Producer.

When trade is dull is the time to advertise. It is easy to sell fish hooks to the merchant, but in order for the sportsman to know who has them, the merchant must advertise that he has them for sale. If the wholesale house sells you a fine article that saves your customers money, how will the prospective purchaser know you have it unless you advertise it? The people depend on newspaper advertising for information.

Seed Clover Is Clipped

Red clover yields more and better seed if it is pastured or clipped back so its period of bloom is delayed about three or four weeks. Clipping usually takes place about May 15 to 20, while pasturing should end about June 1 to 10. A cutting of hay may be made before it reaches full bloom, and a good seed crop then obtained from the second growth where the June or July rains are ample. In dry summers better yields follow pasturing or clipping.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

The first crop of alsike clover is always taken for seed. It should never be clipped or pastured back.

Eggs Easily Preserved

Eggs preserved now while prices are low will permit more to be sold later when every dozen counts more. Sodium silicate or water glass, is the standard preservative. First boil the water to be used and allow it to cool, after which add the water glass at the rate of 1 to 10 or 12, depending on its strength. Use only clean uncracked eggs and put them in in a wooden or earthenware container. The solution may either be poured over all the eggs at once or they may be added each day. Keep them in a cool, dry, but dark cellar.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

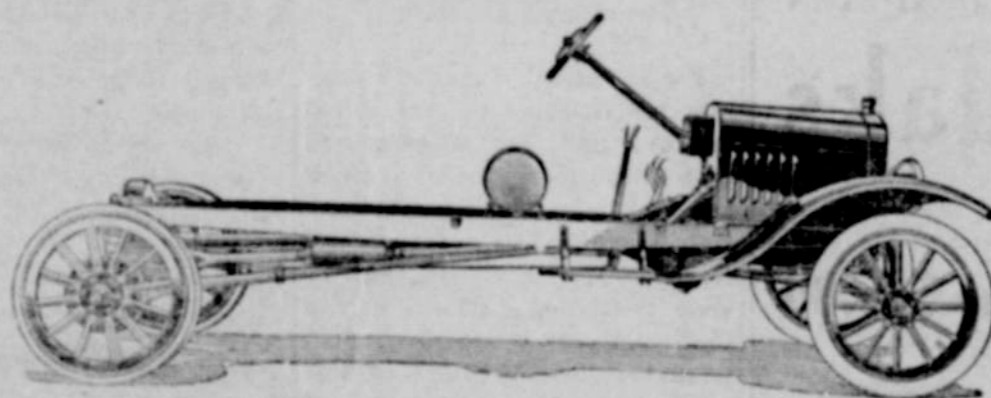
