To the Editor:

I read your article on the numerous thefts from automobiles that have been committed in Scio recently, and note that you expect the culprits will be caught and punished. To be sure, it is to be regretted that such a depraved state exists in Scio, and proper steps should be taken to correct this condition. But—did it ever occur to you that the thieves in question read the newspapers of our state and find therein unstinted praise given to politicians whom they know are grafters. Again, they notice that dishonest business men, "get by" and their innocent victims suffer without redress. There is so much corruption in business and politics that it is no wonder that our boys try the game of getting something for nothing. There is absolutely nothing left to prove to them that "honesty is the best policy". So they follow the example set by men of questionable character who are lauded to the skies by our newspapers and voted into offices of trust.

Young boys are often sent to the "Pen" for lesser crimes than are committed with impunity by prominent men. Such men hide under the cloak of political or business respectability, and go unpunished. I fail to see the justice in it. Consistency is no longer a jewel, and dishonesty stalks abroad with brazen face.

Referring to your article in last week's Tribune, stating that I had been selected as manager of the Linn County Fair. Permit me to say that some how you have been misinformed. At an executive meeting of the Linn County Fair Board on May 20, definite action was taken to secure the services of a competent manager of the Linn County Fair, but I believe to date, no selection has been made.

However at this meeting, I was selected to act as County Exhibit Agent, and instructed to place a Linn County agricultural exhibit at the Oregon State Fair this fall providing sufficient funds could be raised to finance same.

Owing to the stringent financial condition of the country it was not deemed wise to ask for a county appropriation to meet the expense of this work. Believing that the several community clubs and other civic organizations of the county are vitally interested in the development of their respective districts these districts will be asked to finance this work.

You will pardon me for suggesting when the "Forks of the Santiam Community Club" completes its organization, one of its first to take favorable action upon, and by so doing go on record as a wide awake organization working for the development of our community and the building of a greater Linn county.

The past four years Linn county has built for itself an unenviable

reputation of being a slacker county by not supporting our State Fair with a representative agricultural exhibit, and by so doing Linn county has been the loser. The forks of the Santiam and all Linn county could and should support many times the population which it does. We should tell the world what Linn county is, and right here permit me to say that I believe there is no greater medium of advertising a county's resources than by a representative exhibit of that county's resources at the different fairs and expositions.
