Report on Gymnasium

At a meeting of the Gymnasium committee May 29, the following report on finance was made:

In order that no indebtedness might be incurred, it was decided that only that part of the building which needs to be protected should be finished at this time. Mr. Ballin of the Scio Log & Lumber Co., has consented to withhold the flooring temporarily so that that amount may be used to finish putting on the roof and to paint the structure.

It will be noticed in the above statement that the expense for labor is only about half the normal amount. This is due to volunteer labor, chiefly of schoolboys. There has just been a stage in the building when boy labor could not be used. Many men volunteered assistance in raising scaffolding, planks and trusses but when the rafters were put into place even adult volunteers could not be asked to help and a crew was hired temporarily. An adequate crew costs from \$20 to \$25 a day. Bondholders and others interested would do well to boost for volunteer labor as much as possible in order to stop this drain which must be met with further bond sales.

It is unnecessary to expect boys to do all the volunteering. Men have considerable idle time that they could without harm to themselves contribute to the good of the community. All have boosted very nicely so far.

In the future, the proudest people will be those who helped most. Anyone who can drive a nail can be used from now on in finishing gables, roof and shingling. Do not wait to be asked.
