COMPLAINT by some of our women citizens has been registered with the Tribune because some of our men folks forget that gentlemen do not use the sides of buildings, the street and other open places for comfort stations. Of course, nature must have its way, but decency must be practiced.

Too many of our citizens forget the traffic laws of the state and park with their cars facing in the wrong direction, turn in the middle of the block and use the streets as a race course. Some day a catastrophe will occur and heavy damages, and maybe death, will result. The same law is in effect throughout the state, and as we observe it elsewhere let us also observe it at home.

WHEN a reduction in price on commodities, labor or anything else

is made, and the difference given in some other direction, has any real saving occurred? Does the whole people benefit? Will the sweeping reduction made in wages to railway employees be reflected in still lower passenger and freight rates? Will the wage reduction also affect the multitude of lawyers and the higher ups of the railway companies, or does it affect the section men, yard men, brakemen, conductors, firemen and engineers only? Low wage mean low prices for farm produce, wool and other products of the farm, for the less money a laboring man has the less food and clothing he can buy, and the less a farmer receives for his products the less of comforts can he buy. These two elements of society—farmer and laborer—need closer cooperation, for they both are dependent on each other. While we need the railroads and must support them, we do not believe their profits should come entirely from the pockets of their laborers. The railroad man must eat while away from home, and is therefore compelled to pay twice for his food.

THE State Grange before its adjournment last week went on record against giving citizenship to Orientals, native or foreign born; censured judges for doling out light sentences to violators of the prohibition law, opposing repeal of millage measures, champions the public schools and discourages indiscriminate reduction of the tax burden. These expressions by the leading farmers of the state ought to have weight and bear fruit, for they are not given to ride into office on, nor to look well in print. The sentiment against giving citizenship papers to Orientals of foreign birth is commendable, but it is doubtful if that can be made to apply to U. S. births, no matter what action by law the state may take. Judges have been too lax or sympathetic with bootleggers brought before them, and stand the Grange has taken is commendable. A New Jersey judge recently had a bootlegger appear before him the second time, and to show his contempt for the law and enforcement officers, fined the culprit the sum of 5c and upon his statement that he did not have the amount the judge paid it out of his own pocket. Yes such courts need censuring and it cannot be too severe. The fines in such cases should be sentences from six months to six years, and no pardon. Taxes always make a good subject, but to say "indiscriminate" leaves the question open if urging carefulness. Cities, towns, villages, schools and roads need taxes if they keep up, and more taxes if they improve, and so much is needed each year whether the communities are awake or asleep. To reduce taxes is a problem, to raise them is easy. If communities would adopt the "pay as you go" plan, and work out a definite program each year, soon would all conveniences be had and no interest burden hanging over them. Interest soon eats up the principal. The program of the Grange is good and should be adopted by all organ-

izations, as it believes the safety of the nation lies in the public schools in making good citizens, and urges unanimous support.

Boy Found Bruised

A boy aged 14 years was picked up by the side of the road near Albany Monday with his head bruised, and upon being questioned said he had been kidnapped in Portland, gagged and thrown out of the car where found. He gave the names of relatives, who were communicated with, and his father went to Albany and got the boy. It is said his story is true, and that his father had given him some money to take to another son, and this is probably the cause of the tragedy. He was taken back to Portland Tuesday evening by his father, who is a poor man and out of work.

This is to notify all dog owners in Linn county that chapter 186, page 275, general laws of Oregon, passed in 1919, relating to licensing dogs, will be strictly enforced according to law. All persons owning dogs that were eight months old or over at tax collecting time are liable for the tax of \$1.00 for males and \$2.00 for females. Failure to pay same provides for a fine of \$10 for first offense and \$25 for the second. Anyone knowing of dogs without a license let me know, and I will keep the information secret.
