Elmer Whetstone, of Albany, visited at the Fred Sommer home Sunday.

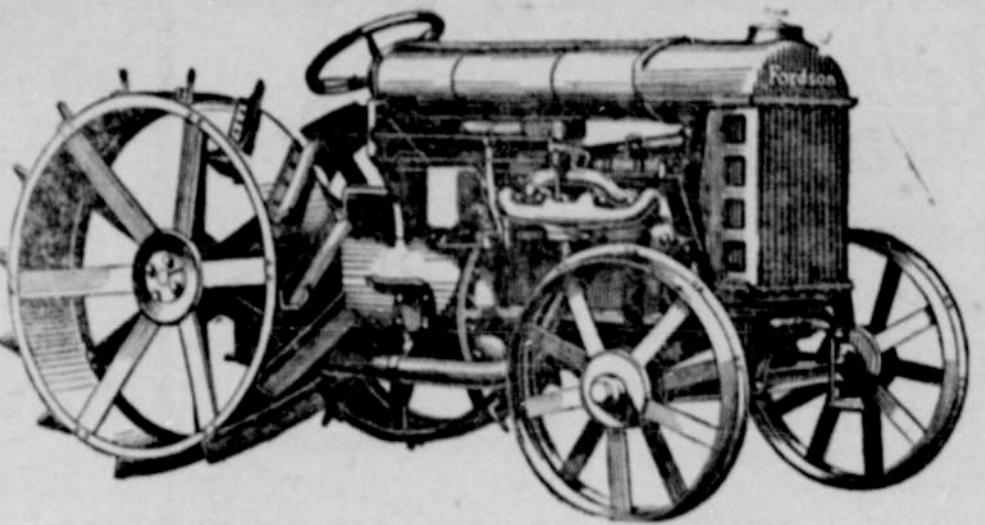
Mrs. Clarence Beauchamp and Mrs. Jack Jones, of Stayton, visited at J. G. Holt's Wednesday.
