All parcels containing such goods should be carefully inspected to determine whether or not they are sufficiently wrapped for safe transmission, according to instructions received by Postmaster J. S. Sticha. Friction top cans used for this purpose cannot be accepted unless crated in such a manner as to prevent the top from becoming loose.

Mrs. Verne Phillips and son Glen called on Grandma Shelton Sunday evening.

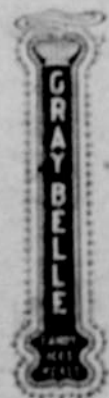
Tom and Gail Phillips, accompanied by Clare Thomas, went on a fishing trip to Wolfe Cabin Sunday and returned Monday.
