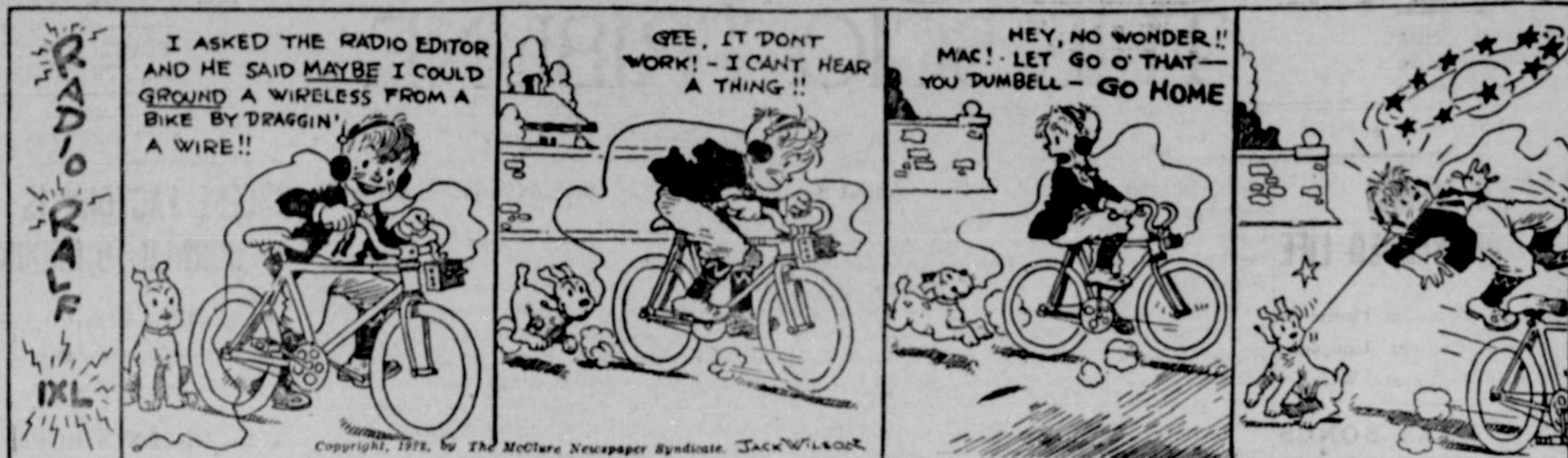

THE SHIP SUBSIDY

It is with considerable interest we read the arguments for and against the government helping the American ship owners with a subsidy, and we must admit all arguments are sound. Every editor is sound and in earnest as he sees the light of any object he discusses.

The amusing thing about this argument for a ship subsidy is that American owners cannot operate their ships upon the high seas in competition with foreign owned ships because our government has passed laws safe-guarding American seamen in living, wage and working conditions, hence we as a nation, through congress, must give these owners the difference between the wages paid an American seaman and a Chinaman or a Japanese. Ye gods and little fishes! What an argument! Subsidy is but another way of expressing protection, and the only difference is that by helping to pay the freight both ways, we get a little more of a bargain from our pockets without returns. There was a time when freighting in the west was done by team. Along came the railroad, put the team freighters out business and when they remonstrated were told "if you cannot compete with the railroads, go out of business, quit, we cannot help you." This also should apply to the ship owners. There is no other equipment other than boats to keep up on the high seas and the ship owners should be able to compete with foreign freighters as well as American manufacturers can compete with foreign manufacturers.

The reason hangings do not occur so readily in the United States is because of laws that make it almost impossible to do so—living, wages and working conditions; the lawyers have to be paid big—while in foreign countries they hang within 30 to 90 days. When they start to do things over the seas, they do them. Americans can do the same. And subsidies and government ownership is not in vogue either. Let's quit taxing the poor of our land through such foolish pieces of law making and get onto a real business basis in a real business manner.
