Requests for information on weather conditions of every description, past, present, and future, come to the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture. Recently a correspondent asked, "What would happen if all the prevailing winds were reversed?" Here's a point equal to molasses and feathers for furnishing endless entertainment to those who have nothing else to think about.

It is becoming appalling the number of auto accidents that occur almost daily, especially on Sundays. Everybody is out on Sunday, and then is when the most accidents occur and just when the utmost care and caution should be practiced by the drivers. It is of some sequence, of course, if the driver kills himself by recklessness, but it is of more sequence when he or she deliberately takes the lives of their passengers by this carelessness. A little horse sense is all that is needed.

Mankind is queer, especially the writers for the big news gathering agencies. We don't know whether they get paid by the inch or word, or just a flat salary, but they can't hang onto a story and make it read the same two days in succession. In the present labor disturbance, one day we read that peace is in sight, the next a break is made and all negotiations are off. One day there is civil war in the coal fields, and the next day we find nothing has occurred. And so it goes with the public not knowing just what the status is and with growing distrust in their belief of the truth of the press.

TURN THE RASCALS OUT

There is getting to be more and more interest taken in the ultimate outcome of the fight the ex-service men are making on the Soldiers Bonus Commission as now being conducted by the secretary, Mr. Braumbaugh, and which has been in effect ever since he took office, and we will be surprised if something does not happen to shake this "worthy" gentlemen from his snug little nest in the state capitol building. It became "necessary," it seems, for Mr. Braumbaugh to go to other states to find his executives, the ex-service men of Oregon not being able to do the work. Proof has been adduced

to show that fabulous salaries are being paid these men, when the salaries should go to the Oregon men, for whom the law was passed. But what can one expect from those who gather their patriotism for state and nation from the dollar. And we are more surprised at Gov. Olcott, who still keeps Braumbaugh when he has proof that he is not using the office to the good of the soldier boys, but to build up for himself a nice political machine that will hold him attached to the \$4,000 salary. It is also proved that a real estate man in Portland, draws \$10 from the state every time he investigates a title, and more often than not he disapproves of the appraisal of men selected for that purpose and who approves the loan asked and the state allows. Another big slice from the state is the expense account of the Pendleton member of the Commission, Mr. Rice. He and the other members of the board draw no salary, but their Portland hotel bills run up to \$200 and over per month. This sort of thing is pure graft from a policy of the state approved by the people to give unto the soldier boy an opportunity to get a home on the installment plan, but the commission and outsiders are eating it up. A clean slate in November will straighten this office out, if not done before. Olcott can make himself a name if he will turn the grafters out. And it will help taxes some.

Council Holds Session

The city council held its regular monthly meeting last Thursday night with the Mayor present, also Councilmen Thayer, Cain, Chromy and McAdoo.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Several bills were presented, and those of contract were allowed, such as excavating the flume and building frames for the cement walls and floor at the dam at Jordon, which was for \$75; City marshal, \$5; fire chief, \$5; city recorder, \$25. The bill for the labor at the flume had not been audited by the light and water committee, and these were held over.

Tony Stacek was present and petitioned the council for an extension of the electric line from the school house to his residence, and

after agreeing to set the polls, the city will string the wires and furnish the polls, and two or more families will be served.

Charley Compton was present and asked the council to extend the water main to his residence. The cost is too great for the service of one patron, and Mr. Compton agreed to get others to go on the line and the city will then lay, with the excavation
